

in that city, but is on the point of setting out on the expedition against Valencia.

The army of Massena, for Portugal, is daily reinforced.—It is said to amount to more than 80,000. It is further said to be in motion for Ciudad Rodrigo, where the Anglo-Portuguese army have collected almost the whole of their force. It is not supposed that the English will risk the issue of a battle. We expect in a few days to receive very interesting intelligence from that quarter.

By letters from Bilbao, we are informed, that general Bonnet fell in with a band of insurgents near Oviedo, of which he made 600 prisoners, and put the remainder to flight.

We have seen several letters from the prisoners in France, brought by the late carts from Moulais. They all speak in confident terms of the speedy restoration of peace between the two countries; an expectation which is at this time very generally entertained throughout the whole French empire, and most anxiously desired and wished for by people of all ranks throughout that country. In consequence of this expectation, the situation of our prisoners had been for some time past greatly ameliorated; their confinement is now by no means rigorous, and extra allowances of provisions have been granted. Such of the women and children as are able, are permitted to work, and provisions of all kinds being plentiful and cheap, they are enabled to live tolerably well, and to render the captivity of their husbands less irksome. The prisoners who last came over, experienced the most marked kindness from the inhabitants of the places through which they passed, many of whom would continually shake them by the hand, congratulate them on their return home, and expressed their most fervent wishes for the return of peace.—(Falmouth paper.)

Government, it is said, have come to a final determination on the subject of the exchange of prisoners of war: A communication from the Transport Board was sent by a messenger yesterday, to Plymouth, to be forwarded by a flag of truce, to Mr. Mackenzie, at Moulais.

June 20.

Advices from Lisbon were received last night at London by an arrival in 16 days. Every thing on the Frontiers appears to be in a state of quiet and inactivity. Lord Wellington maintains the same position in Beira; and Gen Hill occupies, undisturbed, his advanced line of posts in the Alentejo, being within eight leagues of Badajoz, where Romana has his headquarters. The troops are in general healthy, and in good spirits. The army is obliged to depend entirely upon the supplies sent up from Lisbon and Abrantes, as the country can afford nothing.

Letters were yesterday received from Holland, dated the 16th instant, which state that licences had been granted by the Dutch government for ships to clear out for neutral ports, on giving bonds to the amount of three times the value of the vessel and cargo.

There is a report that Swedish property has been sequestered in France and Holland, in consequence of French consuls having been refused a residence in some of the ports of Sweden, and facilities having been afforded for the admission of English merchandize into those ports.

A Gottenburgh mail arrived here yesterday. Some of the letters from Sweden mention the probability of a change in the Russian councils hostile to France. The following are extracts from a few of the letters brought by the mail:

"Stockholm, June 5  
"It is strongly rumoured on 'Change, that peace is restored between Russia and Great Britain, and that, in consequence of it, the former power has entered into a new coalition against France."

"Gottenburgh, June 11.  
"Peace between England and Russia is certain."

"P. S. The letters just come in from the eastern part of the continent are silent on this important subject."  
The two next letters, although of later dates, do not advert to this subject.

A Gottenburgh mail brings accounts from Stockholm to the 7th inst. A decree has been issued, prohibiting the importation of all colonial produce, except in vessels direct from America, into Stralsund.

Extract of a letter from Boston, dated July 31.

"The brig, Corporal Trim, Elwell, arrived at Gloucester at 4 o'clock this morning, in a very short passage from Lisbon—could not get any fruit. Further accounts will, in all probability, be received by this day's mail."

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Stockholm (Sweden) to his friend in Salem, dated May 13.

"The people here appear to be satisfied with the new government, and Gustavus IV. is now an exile in Switzerland where it is said he enjoys himself extremely well. Notwithstanding this external appearance of tranquillity, there is still discontent in the court, for the Crown Prince has three times discovered an attempt to poison him, but he is determined to brave out the storm.

"There will be no hostilities between England and Sweden this year. The French minister for Sweden has taken leave of Bonaparte, and is expected here daily, when it is thought the British minister will have to quit.

"Private letters from Russia say, that discontent reigns there among the lower class of people, and government has doubled the duties on imports and exports. If a general peace does not take place this summer, Russia and France will probably be at swords points."

#### CONTINUATION OF FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE RECEIVED AT BOSTON.

Commercial Restrictions.  
The following is a copy of the general instructions, recently published in Holland, prohibiting the commercial intercourse with this country:—

"GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.  
"It being the intention of the emperor to prevent, by every possible means the introduction into Holland, of English merchandize and colonial produce, the generals in command are to establish, at all points of the coast, a system of the most active vigilance.—They can easily inform themselves who those of the inhabitants are that are reputed smugglers.

"Every person guilty of introducing British merchandize and prohibited goods or of holding any communication, directly or indirectly, with the English, shall immediately be arrested, and tried by a commission to be appointed for that purpose.

"All the Custom house Officers belonging to a district under the command of a general or superior officer, shall dispose of them in such manner as he shall think most eligible from the information he shall obtain as to local circumstances and the inhabitants. In short the general officers commanding any district, shall concert measures with the commanders of the Dutch troops stationed in the district for occupying, with a second line of troops, the most important points, suspected to be used as entrepôts for their trade.

"The goods seized shall be warehoused and a process verbal shall be made, and the property divided, according to the regulations of the Custom house.

"It may frequently occur, that vessels may arrive without being boarded, as far as Rotterdam, Leyd, Dort, and other ports distant from the coast.—The Custom house officers stationed in those ports shall attend the unloading of such vessels, and ascertain if there be on board colonial, English goods, or articles of the commerce of that country.

"When a vessel arrives on the coast, or at the mouth of any river destined for any port in the interior, officers should be put on board, and a guard to accompany the vessel to her destination who will prevent the landing any part of the goods which the parties might be desirous to save from examination.

"General H. Quarters at Utrecht, 13th May, 1810.  
(Signed)  
"Marshal, the Duke of Reggio."

SALEM, July 31.

It was reported at Copenhagen, that several vessels belonging to America had been recently captured up the Baltic by French privateers, names not known.

It was reported in Christiansand, that several vessels had been recently taken and carried to the western ports of Norway, names unknown. There was a number of privateers already fitted out in the ports of Norway, and many more fitting out with all possible expedition. Vessels after having passed Elsinour, and paid their Sound dues, and taken a proper pass, are nevertheless taken and detained by the Danish privateers, as has been evinced in many cases besides capt. Leach's.

NORFOLK, August 1.  
A report is current this morning, that there are some British armed vessels off our Capes; and that the U States frigates, &c. lying in Hampton Roads, are to sail this day in order to prevent their entering our waters. It is apprehended something serious will take place.
