THE NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

The merchants who spend more than one half their time gazing for news, are at length gratified with that brought by the brig Tannahm from Liverpool, up to the 25th of June. Its amount is as follows—Nothing like war between France and Russia. The system of exclusion of British manufactures and colonial produce from the European continent progressing every where. An enormous glut of American produce in the British ports, which they take at their own prices. The commodities of grain, flour and rice, are exceptions, which have become scarce in consequence of bad crops, and the exportation of grain from the European continent being prohibited on account of the price having advanced above the standard limited for permission to export. The Americans supplying the wants of G. Britain, on her own terms, with articles imperiously necessary to her existence, whilst she in return refuses us the liberty of trading with nations with whom we are at peace. Immense exportations of British manufactures were expected to take place in the course of a few weeks to America, chiefly of cotton goods, on which a duty of about 50 per cent. on the first cost of the raw material has been paid by the Americans into the British treasury, and it now comes back, with a variety of taxes, and profits charged on it, and taxed with 15 per cent. duty on this side, in order to raise ways and means for Mr. Gullatin's financial system, which is that of taking money out of the people's pockets without letting them know it. It was almost time for Mr. Pinkney to have attended another sheep-shearing frolic, but we have no account of it. Our affairs are finely managed indeed.

If our minister of the finances, and our ambassador at the court of St. James and Timothy Pickens, had formed a quadruple alliance with Lord Wellesley or Mr. Canning, they could not have managed the affairs of the American nation, more to the exclusive advantage of Great Britain, or to the discredit or dishonour of the United States.

The public mind is very tranquil, and the voice of faction is awfully silent; but the silence of the people proceeds from opposite causes—the people look for a different course of public measures, they cannot confide in any man who would betray the rights of an independent nation; they wait with patience; but deeds, not promises, can alone justify the nation. The faction which has subserved Great Britain, and procured the abandonment of a pacific policy by the repeal of the embargo, are responsible for all the plunder which the legitimate commerce of the United States has sustained in consequence—the events which their perfidy have produced will not place them in power, nor array the American nation under the banner of George III in support of the oppression and desecration of our rights as a free nation; the continent of Europe closed against us, and our flag, which we have suffered to be prostituted, until the national character is sunk, will no longer protect the fair any more than the foul commerce; we shall be embarrassed by bankruptcy and the enmity of all nations, for our policy has been neither just to other nations nor to our selves.

Smoking! pro and con.—In the travels of that good and illustrious Frenchman, Brissot de Warville, in the US 1788 speaking of the practice of cigar smoking he says "this usage is revolting to the French as no instrument is used in the process, and the tobacco itself is thrust into the mouth. It may appear disagreeable to the ladies, by destroying the purity of the breath. The philosophers condemn it as a superfluous want. But it has, however, one advantage; it accustoms to meditation, and prevents idleness. The smoker asks a question; the answer comes two minutes after, and it is well founded. The cigar renders to a man the service that the philosopher drew from a glass of water which he drank when he was in anger." (Boston Chron.

BOSTON, AUGUST 3. FROM ALGIERS.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Algiers, to a merchant in this town, dated May 7.

The brig Blanchy, captain Cotton, which I mentioned in my last as being the only American vessel at this place, was to have departed for Baltimore about the middle of April, but an unexpected occurrence has changed her destination, as she has been chartered by the French vice consul, charge d'affaires of France here, to carry him to Marseilles, he having been ordered by the dey to quit the regency in 24 hours, in consequence of a dispute between them relative to a prize brought in by a French privateer; and as there was no other vessel in the port ready to take him within so short a period, Mr. Lear has consented to her going to France as a cartel. This affair happened the 30th of March. The brig sailed with the consul on the 1st of April, and is to return here immediately in ballast, and is now expected, and is to depart for the

turn. The dey says his dispute is merely personal with this consul, and he has permitted several French vessels to depart since it happened: But I think it will be regarded in a different light in France.

This is such a poor place for business, that scarcely a single article for exportation can be found.

The affairs of the Americans stand very well with the regency at present. Our annuities are all paid up. The ship Resource, which brought out the stores, is daily expected back from Constantinople, for which place she was chartered by the dey to carry presents to the grand seignior." [Palladium.

From the Exchange Coffee House Books. Previous to the sailing of the Pedlar from Palermo, a British frigate arrived there to convey one of the Bourbon family to Spain. Capt Adams, from Lisbon, reports, that Massena had declared himself king of Portugal.

NEW YORK, AUGUST 5.

Letters of a late date from Amsterdam (via England) are received in town—One of them states the following:—The Maria is to sail from this for New York about the 20th May, as a cartel ship, with Captains Stanton, Howich, Cole and Merritt on board.—French commissioners arrived here on the 13th of May, and took possession of all property in the king's warehouses belonging to America, which they intended, to transport to Antwerp for sale."

Shipwreck.—The brig Rufus King, E. Chambers, of Marblehead, master, sailed from Portland June 18, for Cape of Good Hope, with lumber, oars, tobacco, and rum. On the 18th came on a heavy sea with wind from S. E. when she sprung a leak, which increased very much, as also the wind and sea; all hands employed at the pumps; were obliged to heave over part of her deck load, and continue pumping without cessation till 4th of July, at one o'clock, P. M. when in lat 44, 23, fell in with skipper John Collier, of Marblehead, and finding it impossible to prevent the brig from sinking, they began, with skipper C's assistance, to strip her of what could be come at, which being done and put on board his vessel, (all hands being worn down with fatigue) and finding six feet water in her hold, and conceiving she would sink in a short time, proceeded towards Marblehead, and arrived on Friday last with all her hands safe.

CENSUS.

The Citizens of Maryland are respectfully informed, that the Marshal and his assistants will commence taking the third Census this day, each and every free person more than 16 years old, belonging to any family is obliged by the 6th section of the act, under the penalty of 20 dollars, to answer the following questions:

- 1. Who is the master or mistress, steward or overseer, or other principal person therein.
2. How many free white males are in the family under ten years of age.
3. How many of ten and under sixteen years.
4. How many of sixteen, and under twenty six years.
5. How many of twenty-six and under forty five years.
6. How many of forty-five years and upwards—(the three last questions will of course include heads of families).—The same six questions are to be asked concerning white females of those respective ages.
7. How many other free persons are there in the family.
8. How many slaves.
9. Had any other person or persons their usual abode in the family on the first Monday of August, 1810—if any, of what description.

If heads of families or others who are obliged to answer the above questions, would reduce them to writing to be delivered when called for it would prevent much trouble to themselves and unnecessary delay to the Marshal and his assistants.
