WASHINGTON CITY, Aug. 17.

To the Editors of the National Intelligencer.

In justification of the opinion which you have given relative to the merits of a late publication extracted from a Chillicothe paper, and said to be from a correspondent in the Mississippi territory, calculated to injure general Wilkinson, be pleased to give place in the Intelligencer to the following facts—

Louisiana was ceded by Spain to France on the 1st day of October, 1800; and was sold by France to the United States, on the 30th day of April, 1803. In the express terms of the cession of Spain to France. On the 31st of October of the same year, general Wilkinson was appointed second in a commission to receive, not from Spain, but from France possession of the purchased territory—and the notice of his appointment did not reach him until the 24th of November. On the 31st of the same month, the province was delivered by the commissioners of Spain to the French commissioners, Messrs. Claiborne and Wilkinson, accompanied by a body of troops, arrived in the neighborhood of New Orleans, then in the possession of the guards of France. On the 30th of the same month, two days after possession was given to the American commissioners, by the French commissioners, Louisiana, in the face of thousands, agreeably to the conditions on which it had been delivered up by Spain to France. The commissioners of the United States were neither authorized nor instructed to demand specific limits, because our treaty had not defined them, and because the French commissioner might, under such circumstances, have made them what he pleased. The American commissioners, however, like vigilant and faithful agents, instead of agreeing to give up West Florida, as is barely intimated to Wilkinson in the publication above alluded to, determined to seize the first proper occasion to enter their protest resolutely to the United States of all territorial claims and rights founded on the treaty of St. Iliedphous of the 1st of October, 1800—wherein the government of Spain had ceded the province of Louisiana to the French Republic. This occasion was offered by the French commissioner in his letter of the 21st and 25th Jan. 1804, and the American commissioners embraced it to offer the following declaration:

New Orleans, 25th March, 1804.

SIR,

The undersigned commissioners of the United States, appointed to receive possession of the province of Louisiana have observed in your letters of the 21st and 25th Jan. (30 Nivose and 4 Pluviose) that you speak of Spain's retaining possession of West Florida.

It is not the intention of the undersigned to investigate the right of Spain to that tract or to state their opinions with respect to the limits of the ceded territory; but solemnly to protest that nothing done on their part shall be construed as a relinquishment of the claims of the United States to the colony or province of Louisiana, with the same extent, which it had actually in the hands of Spain, (on the 1st day of October, 1800, the date of the treaty of St. Iliedphous), and which it had when France possessed it, and such as it ought to be after the treaties subsequently entered into between Spain and the other States.
