which was in the original ode. Thus amended, not only the poetry, but the sentiments would be correct. This amendment is the more proper, because the term "pirate" which occurs in that ode, can be applied with more force and justice to George the 3d than to Napoleon: the robberies of the former being principally confined to the ocean, and those of the latter to the land. There is still another reason for the alteration. Napoleon had been sufficiently noticed in the preceding verse, while George had escaped the poet's lash.

FOREIGN.

TRIESTE, May 12
A small vessel with assorted merchandise, arrived here from Corfu, bringing the news that that island is in the best state of defence. The garrison consisting of 4000 French and 3000 Albanians, is well provided with ammunition, and the inhabitants have not as yet experienced any effect intended from the blockade. The price of wheat is somewhat high, the enemy having succeeded in capturing some vessels laden with grain from Pouille.

PARIS, May 28.
They intend to raise to day on the pedestal in the place of victory, a part of the colossal statue which undoubtedly is designed to recall to recollection the glorious deeds of the arms of general Desaix in Egypt. This statue is in bronze; the head of which is enormous, and which represents an Egyptian figure, is already on the scaffolding. The pulleys and ropes are in readiness to raise it.

It is reported that Canova is now engaged in the execution of two colossal statues of the emperor Napoleon—the one representing him on foot, the other on horseback. These surpass in dimension, every thing of the kind either in ancient or modern times.

It is said that a bridge will be built on the Scheldt opposite the citadel of Antwerp. This bold undertaking will be of infinite advantage to the departments of the two Netherlands, and of the Scheldt.

NOTE.

Delivered by Count Romanzow, Chancellor of the Russian empire, to Count St. Julien, Austrian ambassador extraordinary at St. Petersburg;

St. Petersburg, April 18.

"His imperial majesty considering Moldavia and Wallachia as composing a part of the empire, and as such must be governed by his laws, declares that no right can any longer be admitted there, the practice of which only takes place in Turkey. His majesty has therefore charged his undersigned Chancellor to declare to general Count St. Julien that every individual born in these provinces, must be considered as a subject of his majesty; that in the mean time he leaves them the choice of remaining in this

quality—or, after paying their debts, and giving an account of the places they held, to quit the country in six months; and that persons born elsewhere, may continue their commercial pursuits in said provinces agreeable to existing treaties, paying regard to the laws as well as to the impetuous necessities and burdens which war occasions. While the undersigned makes this communication to Count St. Julien, he requests him to impart it to his Court.
