37 . In consequence, every package of books imported, shall be put under seal by the custom house officer, and sent to the nearest prefecture.

38 If the books are found to correspond with the permit, every copy, or the first volume thereof, shall be stamped at the provisory place of depot, and be returned to the preprie or.

Of securing Copy Rights

39. Copy righ a sic secured to the author and to his widow during their lives, if the marriage article give her the right, and to their children for twenty years.

40 The authors, whenever denizens or foreigners, of every work printed or engraved, may transfer their right to a printer or bookseiler, or any other perion, who shall enjoy the same right as the authors, as mentioned in the preceding article.

Miscelianeous Revulations.

41. In the following cases there shall be confiscation and fines for the benefit of the state, without interference with the dispositions of the penal code:

1st. If the author or printer's name be not affixed to the work:

2d If the author has not made, before the printing of the work, the entry and declaration prescribed by articles 11 and

8d. If the work having been demanded for examination, the printing or pub-lication of it have not been suspended:

4.h If the work having been examined, the author or printer suffer it to be published, notwithstanding the prohibition of the director general:

5th If the work be published, not with standing the prohibition of the minister of general police, when the author, editor, or princes connot exhibit the process vertal mentioned in article 24 :

6th If having been printed abroad, it is presented for entry without permission, or circulated without being

7th If it be a counterfeit, that is to say, I it be a work printed without the consent, or to the prejudice of the auth or or editor, or their ussigns.

42. In the last the author or editor, or their assigns, shall likewise be entided to damages, and the edition or copies ocunterfehed shall be confisented for their benefit.

43 The penalties shall be declared, and the demages fixed by the correctional or crimi al tribunal, as the case may be, conformably to the law.

44 The proce ds of the confiscations fines, as well as the duties paid on the imperiation of broks, shall be appli ed to defray the expenses of superin tending the professions of printing and bookse ling.

proved by the inspectors of prin-ing and bookselling, by the police officers, and, besides, with regard to books imported, by the custom house officers. na, Duke of Rivolf and Prince of Eating? has taken the chief command of them, conformably to an imperial decree of the 17th of April last: the army to be called

the army of Portugal.
"The prince has also the command of the northern provinces of Spain-viz. of Old Castile, of Leon, the Asturias, the provinces of St Andero and Loirs, of the provinces of Valladolid and Valencia, Toro, Zamora, Salamenca and A-

vila.
"The general of division, Trigion, is appointed chief of the staff; and the ge neral of division, Eble, is to have the command of the artillery, pursuant to an imperial decree of the 21st of the same month

"The head quarters of the prince of Esling are provisionally established at Valladolid

ADDRESS TO THE ARMY.

Soldiers,

His majesty the emperor, on confi ding to me the command of his army of Portugal, has been pleased to associate me in the glory which you are about to acquire in the new expedition to which you are desiried. What obstacles shall be able to resist your va lour, when rigid observance of discipline shall have prepared your success? shall always find in my conduct, and in that of my brother efficers, the examples of pe severance amidst difficulties, fatigues and privations; and your dangers shall be common to us, as well as the glotious result which his majesty expects from the devotion of his heroes of

The letters received by this mail state, that general Massena has also issued a proclamation, addressed to the Portuguse nation, in which he styles himself "king of Portugal"—calling on them to submit to his authority"—threatening in case of non-compliance, that he will desolate the country with fire and sword.

Some of the ict ers also state, that he had also written a letter to ford Welling son, offering to give him permission to re ire unmoies ed from Portugal, if he would depart immediately; but adding, that otherwise, he would drive the Bri ish arm, into the sea in less than three months, and would hang every British officer whom he found in the Portuguese

The French are said to have 73,000 men between Salamanca and Truxillo; 10.000 at Astorga; 10,000 at Ciudad Rodeig; besides 18,000 in small detacaed parties-and the 4th division of the army of Portugal is said to have entered Spain.
