FROM THE VIRGINIA ARBOUS.

The degradation to which the United States have been precipitated is dejecting. Other nations have passed from glory to debasement, but their humiliation has been marked by honorable struggles and manly efforts to arrest the ignominious descent: The United States have been hurried to contempt without a single indication of spirit. We can point to no period of time, in the current of gross insults, and say, "there we made a noble stand for our rights!" From the renown of our ancestors to our present state of object submission there is a frightful chasm, distinguished by no degrees of degeneracy, but over which we have leaped in dismay, and rushed into the marshes and bogs of the vilest disgrace.

Nothing will retrieve us from a state so deplorable but a bold stroke of policy, enforced by vigorous action. Let us step from the filth and mire in which we are wallowing, and make a stride up hill. As our tame pursuit of justice has produced nothing but scorn and injury, why should we not adopt the new code of public law, seize upon the property and persons of our enemies in this country, sequester the one and compel the others to labor for the public benefit. If our enemies demand satisfaction, tell them to come and take it. If they released our imprisoned and imprisoned seamen and honestly return our property or its value, we will enfranchise their subjects and restore what belongs to them; if they come in a spirit of revenge and armed for battle, we will receive them at the mouth of the cannon and the point of the bayonet.

Should our rulers imagine that this course of conduct would be cruel, let them reflect that the first consideration of every government ought to be the welfare of its own citizens; and that the mercy which is exercised to our own ruin, is, in politics, nothing but imbecility.

Neither negotiation nor distant war will procure the liberation of our enslaved seamen nor the restoration of our confiscated property; nothing will effect it but domestic reprisal. "To do a great right we must do a little wrong."

BOSTON, August 20.

Extrait of a letter from Lisbon, dated June 29th, 1810, received by brig America, capt. Truxtun, to a merchant in this town.

"We inclose a price current, observing, that the prices current cannot be materially reduced until ample supplies arrive, as the country and army are experiencing a want of provisions, which can only be looked for from your States; and they, as yet, arrive very scantily. In regard to safety of property here, we feel little apprehensions that any serious alarms can occur during the year; and that in every case, effects under British protection, run no risk from the enemy.

A letter from an intelligent American merchant at Tomninge, dated 18th June, contains the following intelligence.—

"Letters from the interior of Germany, state that Austria was to receive back either Trieste or Ilume; in which case, our ships may be suffered to enter those ports again."

IMPORTANT FROM ITALY.

Arrived at Salem yesterday, ship Francis, captain Haskell, 59 days from Naples—this ship was purchased from the Neapolitan government by Mr. Hammett, the American consul, for the purpose of conveying to their own country, the crews of the American vessels confiscated at that place, as well as at Civita Vecchia.

The following is a list of the masters and supercargoes who left Naples in the above ship, besides 183 mates, seamen, &c.—

Captains Haskill, Cavendish, Currier, Brown, Gardner, Tucker, Lander, Felt, Hanscom, Haskill, Holden, Foster, Bartlett, Holmes, Turner, Newell, Atkins,

Thomas, Martin, Derby, Dixey, Sheffield, Bradford, Gardner, Waterman, Supercargoes Meggett, Clark, Stewart, Smith, Miffin, also capt. Thordike of Salem.

The Francis touched at St. Michaels 18th July, and sailed next day. The persons to whose names in the above list asterisks are affixed, with 17 mates and seamen, left the Francis at St. Michaels, and went on board the Perseverance, captain Meek, who was to sail for New York same day.

The Radius, Lander, arrived at Gallipoli May 18—vessel and cargo immediately taken possession of, and would share the same fate as the others.

Besides the vessels heretofore mentioned as being confiscated at Naples and Civita Vecchia, are the following, viz.—Hound, Urania Kite, Maria, Syren, Peace, Mary, and Two Friends.

Capt H spoke, Aug. 5, lat 43, long. 46, brig Exchange, of and for Norfolk for Belfast, 16 days out. Aug. 8, lat 44, long. 51, brig Federal, Shackelford, 40 days from Gibraltar for Boston.

The brig Orange, Hathaway, of New Bedford, from Cadiz for New York, sailed from St. Michaels 19th June.

The cargo of the sch'r Morning Star, Atkins, confiscated and sold at Civita Vecchia, brought \$28,000, and consisted of fish only. The brig Perseverance, cargo of sugar, pepper and nanikins, was sold for \$118,000.

The treatment of the Americans at Naples, was of a nature to excite the indignation of every man not lost to all sense of feeling for his countrymen.—Not content with taking vessels and cargoes, they were infamous enough to take possession of the private adventures of masters, mates, and even seamen. In many instances, the crews of the vessels in the harbor were turned out without the least notice being given them, to shift for themselves, and not the smallest allowance granted them to subsist upon. Others, after their cargoes were taken from them and confiscated, were called upon to pay the charges of landing the goods, as well as the quarantine charges—which, in several instances, amounted to nearly one thousand dollars each vessel.

And to crown the whole, after repeated applications from the American consul at Naples for liberty to purchase some of the vessels to convey the unfortunate sufferers to their own country, they had the barbarity to refuse even selling more than one vessel for that purpose; but crested into one ship, like so many convicts, upwards of 200 masters, supercargoes, mates and seamen, who were hurried off by the consul as soon as possible, afraid they would retract even the fancied indulgence as a proof of which, several of the masters returned home by the Francis, heard the consul say, after the ship was under sail from Naples, that the minister of foreign affairs had advised him as a friend to hasten the departure of the ship, as he could not answer even for an hour; and all this after the king of Naples had only a short time previous issued a proclamation inviting the Americans to his ports, and promising them safety and protection. Surely such conduct, so contrary to every principle of honour, honesty, or good faith, must excite the execration of every American, and brand the name of Bonaparte and his minions with everlasting infamy.
