### KINGS WITHOUT SUBJECTS.

[Until the late union with Ireland, which gave the king of England an opportunity to alter his ridiculous title. He was dubbed "King of Great Britain, France & Ireland, defender of the faith," &c. The title, however, which old George threw away, has been picked up by a needy Frenchman, who has taken refuge in England. The reader must smile at the following, from a late English paper:]—

"On Tuesday last the king of France, Louis XVIII, paid a visit to the duke of Bedford, at Woburn Abbey, about one o'clock, while his Grace and numerous friends, and agricultural visitors, were attending the ploughing match on one of the farms adjoining the park. The Marquis of Huntley fortunately remained at the Abbey, where he received His Majesty, and of which he did the honors in a manner in every respect worthy of it. The king and suite, after partaking of a cold collation, went over the Abbey, which he very much admired, particularly the magnificent library, and fine collection of pictures. He was sensibly affected at the sight of the fine whole length portrait of his unfortunate brother, Louis XVI. in one of the smaller state withdrawing rooms. His majesty afterwards inspected the farm yards, and implements of husbandry exhibiting for prizes, which were explained to him by lord Wentworth, and at which he expressed great satisfaction. Just before 3 he got into his post coach, and returned to Aylesbury to dinner.

The British ministers are determined to reward Mr. Pinkney for his zeal in their service; he is to be made a *doctor of laws* in one of the universities—it is not said which of his productions has gained him the honors of the university, the address written at Baltimore in which the rights of neutrals was maintained with great ability; or his literary powers in the correspondence with marquis Wellesley concerning the blockades of the Elbe and Weser! *Aurora.*

The English papers again intimate, that Mr. Morier is about to proceed to the United States in the Venus frigate, but it is not yet said that he has any additional title to that of charge des affaires. Perhaps in the end it may appear that it is determined to confer the honor *where it is due, and few men have earned British honors more dearly than Mr. Pinkney.* *16.*

### [TRANSLATED FOR THE WHIG.]

From the Official Gazette of the state of Hayti of August 2.

A New Haven (U. S.) paper of the 29th of May last, says: "The schooner Concord, captain Freeman, has just arrived here from the Cape—passengers, Madam Cox, Madam Martial Besse and daughter, going to Philadelphia. The captain contradicts the report that the president H. Christophe has confiscated American property; he left at the Cape, the brig Joseph, captain Foster, and several other vessels loading."

This is again one of those wicked articles adapted by the inclinations of the *Port of Crimes* to bewilder public opinion. After the clamorous insinuation which we have noticed and denounced in our No. 27, with which those shameful creatures strive to give a bow to our government, by throwing on it a ridicule of which they alone are incapable, we ought not to be astonished at that which their agents utter on the American conduct almost immediately after the same impostures which they wished to give currency to in England. Messrs Lewis and Kest have greatly exerted themselves to cause to appear in foreign papers articles tending to destroy the confidence we have so justly acquired; they will not soften by this hardness of heart of their details of news; a falsehood moreover shall not escape from the talons of those merciless boasters, and the truth will be always more powerful than their intrigues.

The more we scrutinize our conduct in regard to foreigners, the less we comprehend upon what pretext they have built their tale; at least that they mean to speak of the brigantine Dove, capt. George Northon, of Newburyport, taken by our vessels when going out of the Mole, and when confiscation was decreed to the benefit of the captors by a judgement of the tribunal of commerce sitting in this city, dated the 11th of December 181; but there is not the most remarkable

perversion which can blame us for this measure impelled by the urgency of the case and by the imperiousness of circumstances. We do not see how we can be criminated for using a right which is recognised and practised by the oldest civilized nations.

Since when has it been denied to the sovereign of a country to declare a place in rebellion in a state of blockade? At what period and under what government has the marine employed to assist its operations scrupled to capture vessels harrassing themselves to go to afford nourishment to a power placed under the most rigorous circumstances? To what perilous hazards does not a captain voluntarily expose himself when the allurements of profit brings him there in contempt of the intentions and will of the chief of the state? What is the duty of the magistrate, if it is not to pronounce, in obedience to the laws of the country, the confiscation of a vessel which is found acting in contravention thereof?

Until that our perfidious enemies of the *Petion* republic have attained to overturn the respects, considerations and implied conventions which governments owe to each other; until that they have conciliated with the interests of their passions the truths included in the four questions that I am about to establish, we think ourselves supported in the exercise of a right avowed by all the nations of Europe. The 42d article alone of our constitution which says, "By reason of the advantages which foreigners enjoy at Hayti they are to submit, during their stay, to the laws and customs of the country, in like manner as the subjects of Hayti," closes the mouths of our adversaries, and legitimates this measure of rigour. Why, has not captain George Northon transgressed the laws of our country, by supplying with provisions a place declared in a state of blockade by all the official publications emanating from our government, and particularly by the proclamation of the 16th of October, 1809, in entering by stealth a port which he saw blockaded by our vessels? There remains then nothing more than to apply to him the kind of penalty which he has knowingly incurred.

### LATEST FROM CADIZ.

By the ship Maria, captain Chureh we learn that the siege of Cadiz remained much the same for some weeks past; that the party of 5 or 6000 men that had been dispatched under the command of G. N. Lacey, to get possession of the Sierra of Ruda, had returned to Cadiz without accomplishing its ultimate object—which was by co-operating with the British expedition from Gibraltar, to retake Malaga.

General Ferguson had arrived at Cadiz from England and was to rank in the army second in command. We have not been able to learn any further particulars of the defeat of general Crawford in Portugal, as no intelligence had been received at Cadiz of his having effected a junction with lord Wellington's army.

It was rumoured at Cadiz, that gen. Massena had made a retrograde movement, not having a sufficient force to face the combined British and Portuguese armies.

By a gentleman from Hayti, we learn, that about the 25th of July, about 10,000 brigands, under the command of general Gomas, (supposed to be in the pay of Christophe) surrendered by negotiation, to gen. Rigaud at Jeremie, whose force was about 5000. Great joy was expressed on the occasion.
