Republican Nomination. The Conference, delegated from the several sections of Westmoreland, Somerset, Armstrong, and Indiana counties; at present represented by Wm. Findley, have nominated John Kirkpatrick as the republican candidate for the 12th congress.

Creston alias Wilmington, says the Lynching Star of Aug. 17, who carried off Tutbell's wife and child, put an end to his existence in Fincastle jail, on Friday night last, by cutting his own throat, thighs, and face in a most shocking manner with a razor.

The unfortunate man was carried into complete effect, as the principal blood vessels the jugular and femoral arteries were entirely cut through. It is conjectured that the motives which induced him to disfigure his face were to prevent his being readily identified; as he was heard to declare that, he should never appear in any court of justice, and that the principal circumstances of his case should for ever remain a secret. He was in

possession of very large sums of money, of which a considerable portion, report says 16 or 17 thousand dollars, was in Bank Notes. These it is said he destroyed before he perpetrated his last abominable crime.

SIR FRANCIS BURDETT.

The conduct of this gentleman on the most trying occasions has been as prudent and modest as his principles are correct. He retired privately from the Tower; and with a few friends got into a boat, and rowed down the Thames; and eluded the throng of friends and patriots, who were anxiously waiting for him to join the procession. His disappearance gave disgust to the crowd; and two of the committee of arrangement afterwards waited on Mr. Burdett at Wimbledon for an explanation. Burdett told them frankly, that his conduct on the day of the procession was the result of much reflection; that notwithstanding the public might feel disappointed, and would no doubt express that disappointment strongly, yet he was convinced that in less than six weeks there would not be a reflecting mind in the kingdom that would not approve of what he had done.

Our enemies, he said, had been base enough to charge him with the blood that had been shed; and had he, by gratifying his personal vanity, been the cause of a single accident, or the death of any person, he should have reflected upon it with pain for the remainder of his life. "We [Nicholsen & Powell] stated the little probability of, and the precaution that had been taken to prevent, even the possibility of mischief. Sir Francis replied, there was no answering for public feeling. "We further stated that his determination ought to have been made known; to this Sir Francis remarked that it was absolutely necessary there should be an expression of public sentiment; that was now complete, and his being in the procession could not have added thereto. We said, we wished that some of our friends had been in the Tower, to have forced him into the carriage. "Sir Francis expressed his gratitude for that expression of kindness, as indeed he did to all his friends, but this would have had the appearance of flattery; that he looked only to the public cause, which he was convinced would be benefitted by his conduct, and of this all his friends would no doubt be convinced."

I believe not—they are neither federal nor republican, but are generally denominated quibblers, by which is meant a party of no principles, of which John Randolph is the head. Their principal object appears to be anarchy and confusion. Witness the unparalleled misstatements, cutting and twisting of John Randolph. Any man who will be at the trouble of reading the publications in the National Intelligencer, under the signature of Americanus, must be satisfied that John Randolph is either a fool, or worse than a fool—a traitor to his country.

REPUBLICANS BEWARE!

A deep plot is laid to ensnare you. You have seen enough of the insidious designs of the federalists; they know the district is republican, if the republicans will only be true to themselves; therefore, they will not start a federal candidate, lest they should thereby produce unanimity amongst the republicans.
