### LONDON, July 3.

A gentleman from Paris, who left there June 29, informs, that an agreement, under the sanction of government, was made between the captors and the owners of American shapping seized in the ports of Nantz and Boulogne, supulating that the former should receive half the proceeds of the ships and cargoes, and the proprietors be entitled to the remainder. It was not known if the same indulgence would be extended to other ports. All American vessels, whether direct from the United States or otherwise, were taken possission of by the French, and the cargoes of the ships which had been before sequestered were on sale. Anierican citizens were treated with the greatest severity at Paris. This person is an American, and his motive for quitting the French capital was the apprehensions that before a week should elapse, passports would be refused to the natives of the Republic.

#### SALEM, August 24.

On Wednesday arrived here he brig Venus, captain Tunison, from Buenos Ayres. Mr Nathan Cook, the supercargo, informs us, that a revolution had taken place there, similar to that in Caraccas-the authorities emanating from the Supreme Junta of Old Spain had been put down, and a new provisional government set up, which professed loyalty to l'erdinand VII, and to con inue only till his restoration to his thronebut actually, no doubt, with a view to complete a permanent independence Mr. Cook was in confidential relations with some of the leaders, who informed him, that they contemplated a govern-ment as near like that of the U States, us the genius and habits of the people would admit of; but were aware, that those were not such as to enable them to enjoy the same degree of political free dom with us. Ti us, while the ambition of Bonapatte is overlurning the old establishments, and shutting up the usual channels of commerce in Europe-new States are rising, and new paths to commerce opening in the west, ra world.

# FROM GOTTENEURGH.

Capt Forbes, who arrived this morning from Gottenburg, informs that all the ports of Denmark were shut against American vestels-that the Danish privateers capture every American they can come across, and that the most of them were condemned under some pretext or other. It was currently reported at Gottenburgh, that the emperor of Russia had made propositions to the English to join him in a war against France. A French consul was hourly expected at Contemburgh, when it was supposed all Inserican property would be requester ed. In consequence of this information, the American vessels had hauled out of the reach of the castle

Captain Forbes also informs, that the Marshai at Gottenburgh was taken from his carriage by the people, and tom to pieces, on account of a suspicion that he had been accessary to the death of the Crown Prince

The British consul's functions ceased on the 20th June at Gottenburgh, by or

der of the Swedish government. Mr. Renest Dickson, who had usurped the power of acting as American consal, was said to be an agent of the go vernor of Anholt, and concerned with lum in several privateers. This contributed not a little to exasperate the Danes against the Americans; in consequence of which, it being discovered that the said Dickson had no authority to act as consul, a meeting was held by the A-mericans in port, and a letter addressed to Mr. D pointing out the impropriety of his opening dispatches from sur gov ernment, and likewise the pernicious tendency his conduct would have in ad minis ering an office he was in no wise entitled to the possession of.

The British admiral on the station re fused to give convoy instructions to any but vessels having licence, but observed that he conceived himself bound to protect all American vessels that chose to join the convey, and should protect them accordingly. The Sylp was boarded by the Thamer gan brig, and treated po-

litely.

Petion's fleet, with a number of his wounded on board, had escaped from the Mole, and arrived at Port au Prince, with the loss of his three masted science The schooner being closely pursued by Christophe's fleet, was run on shore and blown up by her erew, on the island of Guanab.
