THREE THOUSAND FREEMEN REJOICING. In commemoration of the Glorious Victory

AMERICAN PATRIOTS, Commanded by the Veteran General JOHN STARK, over the Erilish, Hessians, Tories, & Indians, on the Heights of Walloomsack, the 16th August, 1777.

Remember the glories of Patriots brave, Though the days of the Heroes are o'er, Long lost to their country and cold in their grave,

They return to their kindred no more : Those stars of the field, which in victory pour'd

Their beams on the battle, are set, But enough of their glory remains on each sword

To light US to Victory jet!

Walloomsack! when nature embellish'd the tint

Of thy fields and thy mountains so fair, Did she ever intend that a tyrant should print The footsteps of slavery there ? No-Freedom! whose smiles we shall never

r sign, Told these who invaded our plains, That 'tis sweeter to bleed for an age, at thy shrine

Than to sleep but a moment in chains.

Forget not the chieftain of Hampshire, who stood

In the day of distress by our side-Nor the Heroes who nourish'd the fields with their blood;

Nor the Rights they seem d as they died. The sun, that now blesses our eyes with his

Saw the Martyrs of Liberty s'ain; Oh let him not blush when he leaves us to night,

To find that they fell there in som!

The anniversary of the memorable victory of the 16th August, 1777, was co memorated near the field of conquest by the republican freemen or the countres adjacent, with those serious and animated demonstrations of graitude, which the surrounding scene, the event, the advantages resulting and now enjoyed, were calcula ed to produce.

I'me dawn of the day was announced by the discharge of comon by the Hosick Artitlery at the encampment, and the Pit stown Artillery at the battle ground. The weather was science and temperate. On the ground of General Stark's en campaient the appointed place of rendezvous, a flag of union, suspended from a lofty Fag staff, was floating to the breeze: on one side the flag was represented a descending cagle, bearing in its k the emblem of peace-in its cle ch ed tolons it held the embleus of war, indicating a wish for peace, yet prepared for resistance; on the opposite side the usual symbolical stripes and stars were displayed; to the right of these was a representation of the Godders of Liborty, standing in the attitude of rollictation. The aged soldier obscives in figure; he looks to the hills of the wes-where raged the battle; his thoughts are of other times; he looks again to the fly of his country; he recognizes the angel form of Liberty which erst he had seen mounting the gathering clouds of war, screnely moving and mixing with the stately spirits of the sorm; she, by God's appointment, inspirited and sustained him in the conflict—He thanks his God, and renews his allegiance to Lib.rty.

Midway, below the flag of Union, was suspended another flag on which were wittenin conspicuous characters, "JEF-FERSON & MADEON "

At equal distances on either side the standard of Union, 18 trees were planted, on each of which was suspended a flag with the name of a State written thereon arranged in geographical order.

The effect of the whole was striking The mind became intuitively familiar with the subjects immediately connected with the occasion of the meeting. The ich flow of thought-the crowd of images presented to the image ationand the joby and kindling enthusiasin excited, out reach nation

At half past 11 o'clock, the procession formed, under the direction of Col D 301 Robinson, marshel of the day, and his as iglants; and merched to a view of the bat le ground. The Hosick Avallery, stationed at the encampment, announced by a gun the first moving of the procession, and the Pirst wn Arallery announced by a gun the near approach of the procession to the Hill of Victory. In trout of the procession were placed the citizens who volunteered their servi ces as Muscians, coxisising of the Petersburg Band in be Muni waform, and martial music-alternately playing their favorite marches Next grarched 700

fortmen-these were followed by aged and other citizens of horse-back and in carrieges, amounting in the whole to thee thousand, and for exceeding in numbers any procession ever witnessed

It was very interesting to behold,, as the procession moved along the aged na viet point the young men to the place where the disciplined invaders intrenched themselves, where our brave but un-disciplined Patriot husbandmen planted the standard of victory; here the Hessian dead were buried; there is the "narrow house" of Baum their chieftain; and here the remains of the Tory commander were consigned to kindred earth :- but these constituted a part only of the group of incidents which contributed to make the scene deeply impressive-" the harvest for feeling.

The procession, joined by the Pitts. town Artillery, returned again to the encampment :- where the Rev. Mr. Marsh opened the exercises by an excellent prayer, at once descriptive, pathetic and An Oration was then pronounced by Jesse L. Billing, Esq. in which he depictured the glooms and horrors of slavery and despoilsm in every quarter of the world: in Africa, where the parent for a p ice sells his children to very: in Asia. where for ages man has been the slave of slaves: in Europe, where its footsteps have been marked by blood and tortures; and lastly and more lengthily, he dwelt upon the attempt made by England to enslave A-mericans, and bow the lofty spirit of freemen to her cadaverous influence. -Their brave and successful resistance he portrayed in glaring and pathetic lan-He reminded the citizens that guage. ascriptions of gratitude were due to God: and he concluded by patriotic wishes, that the blessings of freedom might be extended and perpetual.

It is expected the Oration will soon be

published, when the public will be better able to judge of its merits, than by any delineation we can give.

After the Oration, the citizens partook of a cold collation. The cloth being removed, the following Toasts were drank, in erspersed with appropriate original songs, under the discharge of cannon.

It was, indeed, an exhibition of sentiment - a simultaneous expression of grati ude. Order and decoruin were preserved; no noise or riot desturbed the solemnities, no disputes interrupted or checked the temperate fes, ivities of the dy. Good, though not complete, was evidently predominant - Patriotism gained force; the living heroes were gratified; the departed patriots were remembered; jicty grew warmer, and the signal inercies of the God of Columbia
