MILTIADES.

LONDON, July 3.

A gentleman from Paris, who left there June 29, informs, that an agreement, under the sanction of government, was made between the captors and the owners of American slupping seized in the ports of Nantz and Boulogne, supulating that the former should receive half the proceeds of the ships and cargoes, and the proprietors be entitled to the reminior. It was not known if the same indulgence would be extended to other ports. All American vessels, whether direct from the United States or otherwife, were taken possession of by the French, and the cargoes of the ships which had been before sequestered were on cale. American citizens were treated with the greatest severity at Paris. This person is an American, and his motive for quitting the French capital was the apprehensions that before a week shouldelapse, passports would be refused to the natives of the Republic.

SALEM, August 24.

Revolution at Buenos Ayres.

On Wednesday arrived here he brig Venus, captain Tunison, from Buenos Ayres. Mr Nathan Cook, the supercargo, informs us, that a revolution had taken place there, similar to that in Caraccas—the authorities emanating from the Supreme Junta of Old Spain had been put down, and a new provisional government set up, which professed loy-a ty to l'erdinand VII, and to con inuè only till his restoration to his thronebut actually, no doubt, with a view to complete a permanent independence Mr. Cook was in confidential relations with some of the leaders, who informed him, that they contemplated a government as near like that of the U States, as the genius and habits of the people would admit of; but were awate, that these were not such as to enable them to enjoy the same degree of political free dom with us Tius, while the ambition of Bonaparte is oversurning the old es tablishments, and soutting up the usual channels of commerce in Europe-new States are using, and new paths to com-merce opening in the western world.

Monte Viedo was wavering as to a concurrence with Buenos Ayres -- as a report was spread, that Spain was not so far conquered as had been represented.

NEW-YORK, August 25.

FROM GOTTENEURGH.

Capt Forbes, who arrived this morning from Gottenburg, informs that all the ports of Denmark were shut against American vessels-that the Danish privateers capture every American they can come across, and that the most of them were condemned under some pretext or other. It was currently reported at Gottenburgh, that the emperor of Russia had made propositions to the English to join him in a war against France. A French consul was hourly expected at Gotte burgh, when it was supposed all American property would be sequestered. In consequence of this information, the American vessels had hauled out of the reach of the castle

Captain Forbes also informs, that the Marchai at Gottenburgh was taken from his carriege by the people, and torn to pieces, on account of a suspicion that he had been accessary to the death of Crown Prince


