

and such as the court was imperiously called upon to visit with a heavy hand.

It was much to be lamented, that a man who had the experience of the defendant, should, after all that passes in life so constantly before his eyes, grow worse; and as he increases in years, in crime in malignity. It was also to be lamented, that the numerous examples made of libellers, had no effect upon him; but that knowing the fatal consequence of such conduct, he still perseveres in spreading the poison of most destructive malignity through the nation. A check must be put to such mischief: the state must be governed—the army must be satisfied that their fellow citizens are satisfied with them—the foreigners in our service must not be trauced, when they are labouring in common with the whole of our military system, to support the dignity, and protect the safety of the empire—and the military system must not be moved to a disgust of the service in which they are employed. For these reasons the court holds itself called upon to exert its authority this day. The learned judge then adverted to the libel, noticing the most prevailing features of it and then in an emphatic manner proceeded to pass the following:

Sentence on William Cobbett. "The sentence of the Court is, that you Wm. Cobbett, do pay a fine to the King of 1,000l. that you be imprisoned in his Majesty's goal of Newgate for the space of two years; that at the expiration of that period, you enter into recognizance to keep the peace for 7 years, yourself in the sum of 3,000l. and two sureties in the sum of 1,000l. each. And further that you be imprisoned till that recognizance be entered into, and that fine paid."

His Lordship then proceeded to pass the sentence of the Court on the other three prisoners:—T. C. Hansard to be imprisoned in the King's Bench prison, three months, and to give security to keep the peace—himself in 400l. and two securities in 200l. each. Budd and Bagshaw were sentenced each to two months imprisonment in the same place.

Sweden is torn to pieces by intestine evils. The Marshal of the kingdom has fallen a sacrifice to the vengeance of the populace, on a supposition that he abetted the intrigues of France, to place the country under the dominion of Denmark; as the Swedes have the most rooted hatred for the Danes, which nothing can eradicate. The general opinion is, that Bonaparte wishes to consolidate the two kingdoms under one crown; and after the odious business is accomplished, he will place Louis Bonaparte and some other of his family on the throne, as his great object is to have the command of the Sound. Our ministers foreseeing that such is his object, will cause, it is said, a great blow to be struck in the north of Europe in the course of the summer, as Bonaparte has an eye upon the Swedish fleet. Another revolution is expected in Sweden, but no revolution can rescue that unfortunate country from his hands.

The destiny of Holland is fixed, and it is now doomed to be governed by the military myrmidons of the French chief; to whom, however, the people are expected to give unavailing resistance. A storm is gathering over the Turkish empire; and expectations are entertained in the French Journals, that the present government will be speedily overthrown. These perpetual convulsions and revolutions never, however, better the condition of the poor.

July 10. The basis of a cartel for the exchange of prisoners, has been agreed upon. The last dispatch to Mr. Mackenzie communicated to him the terms upon which our Government have acceded. This intelligence was brought by Mr. Wye, the Messenger who arrived last night at Metz.

Letters of the 26th ult. from Gibraltar report that the Regency of Cadiz, feeling themselves secure from the attempts of the French to subdue that place, have deemed it expedient to send 5000 men to Algiers, with a view to cut off, if possible, the retreat of the French from the part of the peninsula.

The same letters state, that the inhabitants of Madrid have several times attempted to extricate themselves from the oppression of the French in that city; but owing to the enemy's force being very great, without any kind of success. Their spirits, though restrained, is by no means subdued.

The brave general O'Donnell, partly from the severity of his wounds, and partly from disgust has resigned his command. The French had been repulsed in an attack upon Miguel Coza, and Gen. Doyle left Farragosa with a reinforcement of 2500 men, and a large supply of provisions for that place, so that apprehensions were entertained for its safety. South, as well as Angereau, is said to have been disgraced, and recalled from his command. The Spanish army of the Centre was in a formidable state of re-organization, and shortly expected to present a formidable front to the country.

We have received letters from our squadron off Toulon, to the latter end of May. The enemy's fleet had been repeatedly reconnoitred by the Unity frigate, and ascertained to consist of 17 sail of the line, 4 of which were three deckers and carrying about all's flags, and apparently ready for sea. Sir C. Cotton had, in consequence, dispatched orders to Minorca, &c. for the re-assembly of his fleet; and during some days before the close of our letters, all our ships were kept clear for action.

The Unity, Voltaire, and Alacrité, were chased off Toulon by two sail of the line and a frigate; but it blew hard at the time, and the enemy soon returned to port, followed by our vessels, who greatly outailed them.

DUBLIN, July 14. Many foreign papers, and a great number of private letters have arrived, the contents of which, in their substance, will be found in another part of our paper. The principal interest of the foreign papers, are the loose hints which they contain of the active execution of the league between the emperors Francis, Napoleon and Alexander. It is not usual with the foreign editors to speak out upon these heads: the liberty of the press is still more narrow in France than in England, and the government has its eye and its attention every where.—Enough, however, may be collected even from the loose hints and detached paragraphs, to lead to a conclusion that there is a general expectation on the continent that a campaign is meditated in Moldavia and Wallachia.

PORTUGAL. The treaty with the Prince Regent consists of upwards of 70 articles, and is of prodigious length. In one respect, the Portuguese negotiators seem to have misunderstood their interests. Numerous privileges are given to the native ships both of Great Britain and Portugal, but those of Portugal are restricted to such vessels as are built either in Portugal or the Brazils, which limitation does not comprise any more than two-fifths of the shipping property of the Portuguese.

From the French Papers. GOTTENBURGH, June 16. Admiral Sannaraz has received orders to release all the Swedish coasters which he had detained, and henceforth not to molest the Swedish coasting vessels, be their cargoes what they may.

MUSICH, June 15. An article from Semlin says, that the Russian envoy had made overtures to the Servian council, for entering into the court of St. Petersburg.

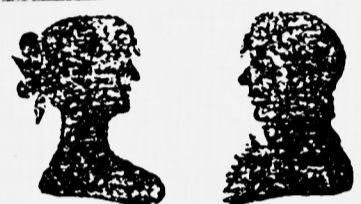
