and such as the court was imperiously called upon to visit with a heavy hand.

It was much to be lamented, that a man who had the experience, of the defendant, should, after all that passes in life so constantly before his eyes, grow worse; and as he increases in years, in crease in malignity. It was also to be lamented, that the numerous examples raide of Libellers, had no effect up on him; but that knowing the faral consequence of such conduct, he still perseveres in spreading the poison of most destructive malignity through the nation. A check must be put to such mischief: the sta e must be governedthe army must be satisfied that their follow civizens are satisfied with them-the foreigners in our service must no; be tra duced, when they are labouring in com mon with the whole of our military sys tem, to support the dignity, and protect the safe y of the empire-and the milita ry system must not be moved to a dis gust of the service in which they are employed. For these reasons the court holds itself called upon to exert its authority this day. The learned judge then adverted to the libel, noticing the most prevailing features of it and then in an emphatic manner proceeded to poss the following Sentence on William Colbett.

" The sentence of the Court is, that you Wm. Cobbett, do pay a fine to the King of 1,0001 that you be imprisoned in his Mejes y's goal of Newgate for the space of :wo years; that at the expira-tion of that period, you enter into recognizance to keep the peace for 7 years, yourself in the sum of 3,000l. and two surcties in the sum of 1,0001. each -And fur her that you be imprisoned till that recognizance be entered into, and that fine paid"

His Lordship then proceed to pass the sentence of the Court on the other three prisoners :- T. C. Hansard to be imprisound in the King's Beach prison, three months, and to give socurity to keep the peace-himself in 400l, and two securi tics in 2001, each

Budd and Bagshaw were sentenced each to two menths imprisonment in the same place

Sir C Cotton had, in consequence, dispatched orders to Minorca, &c. for the re assemblement of his fleet; and during some days before the close of curletters, all our ships were kept clear for action.

The Unity, Voluntaire, and Alacrity, were chased off Toulon by two sail of the line and a frigate; but it blew hard at the time, and the enemy soon, returned to port, followed by our vessels, who great-ly outsailed them.

Durlin, July 14. Many foreign papers, and a great-number of private letters have arrived, the contents of which, in their substance, will be found in another part of eur papaper. The principal interest of the foreign papers, are the loose hints which they contain of the active execution of the league between the emperors Fran cis, Napeleon and A'exander. It is not usual with the foreign editors to speak out upon these heads: the liberty of the press is still more narrow in France than in England, and the government has its eye and its attention every where .-Enough, however, may be collected even from the loose hints and detached paragraphs, to lead to a conclusion that there is a general expectation on the continent that a campaign is meditated in Moldavia and Wallachia.

PORTUGAL. The treaty with the Prince Regent consists of upwards of 70 articles, and is of prodigious length. In one respect, the Portuguese negociators seem to have misunderstood their interests. Numerous privileges are given to the native ships both of Great Britain and Portugal, but these of Portugal are restricted to such versels as are built either in Portu gal or the Brazils, which limitation does not comprise any more than two-fi the of the shipping property of the Portu-
