## RURAL ECONOMY.

A MEAN TO INCREASE MANUEE.

Adjoining the stye where your swine Tare shut up, which should be doy and wirin, fesce a yard for them to wal ou in; twenty or thirty tool square will be large enough for half a dozon hogs; cover this in the fall er spring with mud, er any tich earth, or grass sads: com-mos ioam should not be refused, if ticher earth cannot be procured. The hogs, having no rings in their noses, will rendtwo feet deep, an exceeding rich com-post in a year's time. They will keep it stirring and fermenting with their dong and trine, which will be incorporated with the mud, and thereby their whole strength will be saved; for the mud or earth will prevent the vir ues of the dung and urt. e from being washed into the ground by heavy rains or evaporated by the sun and air. It not only saves them, but makes them stronger, by heeping them in a state of constant fermentation; the forment-tien will be merease i, and the whole mass will be improved by ma hing this yard the receptacle for the weeds of your garden. Throw into it your soap suds, brine, and all the greaty slop of the kitchen. You may add potatee tops, which should be core ully saved for the purpose when you gather the potatees; also the stubborn corn stalks. which ou slowly in the cow-yard, will even consume in the hog yard. any vegetable or animal substance may be added; for there is none which will not make manure when rotter. Half a chizen hogs, if confined to a sije, and such a yeld, will make more than twee to tens of the best menure in one v ar The mature should be laid in he.ps to mellow with the fres's of one winter, and it will enswer to put into the hills of Indian corn as well as horse dung.

" Christophe is a perfect black, born in the island of St. Christopher's-a cru-el and determined character, but withal very cunning and polite. I am told he pretends often not to understand English, but in fact understands and speaks it very well; and by this finesse frequently gets information which is very useful to him I will relate a circumstance of an American muster of a merchantinan, who was undergoing some examination before Caristophe, & ungua dedly made use of expressions which had nearly cost him his life. An English gentleman who understood French, and acted as interpreter to Christophe, was examining this American, who being impatient asked, what does the d-d block tascal say? Christophe invited this American to breakfast next morning, and told him he was perfectly aware of some expressions which had dropped from him the day before, but that he forgave him, and then cauttoned him to be more circum spect in making use of such expressions in fu ure

Petion is a much milder character than Christophe-a mulatto, and the man who caused the death of Dessalines, whose crue'thes and atrocities in St. Domingo are will known every where By the most correct information I can obtain, Cristophe's party is the most respectable and powerful-Petion's the most just.

The government of the island is very desp. tic Christophe's word is a law Frequent'y when a criminal is brought before him, after hearing the compleint, he orders him to be bayonetted on the spot, without any trial or respite. He is the most police and affable man imaginable; lives in very great style; has a palace in every quarter of his territories, and to into ensely rich. He looks well to this part of the government, and is very visici us. He is a man about 40: tail, well made, and a fine handsome soldier like appearance

The produce of the island is chiefly coffee (which is of a superior quality), and cotten; but immense tracts of most excellent land once under cultivation, now lies totally waste. Near Gonnives is a large tract of rich land, of this description, only wanting cultivation
