Bu, in June 1794, he safel with James Monroe and family to Franc. -On their arrival at Paris, Mr. Motroe was received with open arms and the most enthusiastic admiration by the Na. tional Convention,—as the Representa tive of the first nation that had sent a minister to the Republic, or acknow-ledged France as such; Mr. Monroe in the spirit of republican friendship, sent a Flag of the United States, to be placed in the Hall of the Couvention; and Jo shus Barney was charged to present it When the splendid ceremony was performed amidst the acclamations of res pect, and shouts of applause-the Con vention voted, that Commadore Barney should be employed in the navy of the Republic-grounding their appointment on these reasons— That Commodore Barney having rendered so much service in giving liberty to America, (as mentioned in Mr. Monroe's letter to the Convention) would be a proper person to aid in fighting against its enemies in Europe

In this manner, truly honourable to himself and terrible to his old implaca ble enemy (Great Britain) did Joshua Barney, become an officer in the navy of France, at a time when she was fighting for liberty against a combined world .-Good fortune did not forsake Barney in his new commission The enemies of Freedom he often combated, and as of ten beat. But mark it Americans! for Calumny has been busy in misrepresent. ing the motives that led Barney into the French service, and his conduct in it.-When he entertered it in the manner stated, every bosom heaved with wishes and sympathetic pulsations for the success of France. She was then contend ing for republican liberty, and the would have established it, had not repeated co alitions turned her industrious citizens into military legions. A powerful standeng army drove republicanism out of France; and then Barney fersock it also. When Bonaparte usurped the powers of the regular constituted legislature of the French notion, and deposed the council of five hundred, Commodere Barney, as soon as he could settle his affairs in France, returned to his native country. He loved independence too well, to re main a France notwithstanding the weak and honours he might have acquire ed under Bonsparte.
