have manifested an unalterable deterscation to preserve it at all hazardsthen, and not till then, can we expect to be treated by foreign nations, and espo cially by Great Britain and France, with the respect due to a powerful people.

The spirit of Campbell was the spirit of patriotism, of honor and of indepen-dence; it was the genuine spirit of seventy eix; and the nation felt proud when they perceived that Cor gress caught it from his glowing and energetic report like the fire of electricity—but unfor tunately for that body and for their country they suffered it, like the same clement, to pass off so rapidly as to leave scarcely a distinct recollection of the impression they had received from it. (Albany Reg.

The discoveries in South America continue to exhibit to us the great labors which some unknown nations have employed in remote times, in the vast works which are found even upon the heights of the Andes We learn from the Portbguese at Rio Janeiro that count Ga latas had surcee led the deceased count Acadia as minister of marne and of the colonies. We hear of continued efforts to extend the commercial relations of Brazils with the European powers.
