

day, painted upon the public as national
law.

This course was pursued till the mo-
ment when of col. Pickering to the
late gov. Sullivan made its appearance.
This was certainly a time to pause.
perused that letter with the most delibe-
rate attention. He saw in this letter, as
he has in most of the other productions
of that singular man, the author's claim
to superior talents and integrity; and
could only regret that his title to these
commanding qualities was not better
substantiated in his disgraceful and most
disastrous performance. He saw, to be
sure, in the unexampled efforts to give
this letter a circulation and sanction, the
effect of some secret charm utterly be-
yond his comprehension. But he was
confident, who ever might be the weight
of talent and integrity concerned, that no
human authority could annul those laws
which God has made eternal, or conceal
those facts which speak to the senses of
universal man. From this remarkable
epoch in the history of American folly,
opposition to our government assumed a
new form, and acted ostensibly upon
new principles.

A British faction that had apparently
slept in our country, on the point of be-
ing smothered by the embargo, and roused
by the threatening terrors of its last
pangs, rose to its desperate work of mis-
chief. It was manifest that such a mon-
ster of political madness must either be
seized and chained by the strong hand of
government, or left to roam at large, till
it destroyed itself or its country. It was
not to be (as it was) reason. The Volun-
teer enlisted on terms prescribed by
himself—one of which was, not to labour
in vain.

In a note to his last number in the
Chronicle on the subject of col. Pickering's
letter, he pledged himself to re-
sume the discussion of our maritime
rights, and to expose the egregious
errors of that extraordinary produc-
tion.

Since the establishment of the Boston
Patriot, either the flattering hopes of an
honorable adjustment with England, or
the more local and transient topics which
have grown out of our disjointed political
relations, have diverted the writer's at-
tention from his leading object. The
Patriot has contained his desultory inter-
vening numbers. His fictitious signa-
ture was not adopted, and will not be
continued to shun personal responsibility.
It was intended to be characteristic
The writer is not a mercenary, and is at
no man's command. Whatever has ac-
companied this signature, has been un-
dertaken and executed with thorough
deliberation. The cause he has espoused
requires the effectual use of offensive
armory, and the impenetrable shield of
truth.—He has been ambitious of the
honors of both.

It has been his fortune to put to the
test the magnanimity of col. Pickering.
That arch "advocate of the British
cause in America" has descended from
the dignity of his character and his
cause, to direct and indirect slander of
the author. The dire disgrace intended
for another, at the expense of his own
integrity, has returned to its prodigal
donor. In this waste of character he has
been too sparing of his reason to point
out a single error in fact or argument.
The time has arrived that such advocates
can no longer find a substitute for reason
in the imposing authority of their own
names; and that such a cause has no
guarantee of success in the current of
popular passions. Exhausted in the
war of maniac folly, faction itself pauses,
and pants for a truce. If not tamed, it
is at least tired of the course it has run;
and is so far in the power of the friends
of our country, that they are responsible
for its future demeanor. The adversary
has spent his rage in his mad career—
and we have learnt that beyond his own
frothy effrontery, he has no resources
but in our folly and our fears. Let not
our weakness again contribute to his
strength.

THE VOLUNTEER.

NEW YORK, October 11.

Mr. Arcambal, who has for several
years been acting as French Consul, is a-
gain to reside here by order of his gov-
ernment in the same capacity, and in
that of Consul General.

Three houses, corner of Elm street
and Catharine lane, were last night de-
stroyed by fire.

Capt. Mariner who arrived this morn-
ing from Port au Prince, informs that a
terrible battle took place on the 24th of
August last. Christophe had collected
all his troops from the out posts, with a
determination to take the town of Port
au Prince by a coup de main. He com-
menced the attack at 12 o'clock at night
of the 24th of August, and the battle
lasted until 8 o'clock next morning.—
His force consisted of about 25,000 of his
best troops. Petion met him with only
1500; but notwithstanding the superi-
ority of Christophe in numbers, he was
completely defeated. 600 of his men
were killed; among whom were two
Marshals (Baze and Manne)—two other
Marshals were wounded and taken pri-
soners. 500 muskets were picked up
after the battle. Petion's loss was only
about 60 men. Five of Christophe's
barges in attempting to go into the har-
bor of the Mole, were attacked by four
of Petion's, commanded by a lad of about
18 years of age, who took four of them.
The other escaped.

his schooner foundered in sight of Hat-
teras Shoals, and that he was taken out
of his board the same day.
