From the Merchants' Coffee-House Boats.
October 20.
Arrived, sch'r Speedwell, Atkinson, 31 days from Gonaves—coffee, &c.—George F. Warfield, Captain A. contradicts the account of Pettou having gained a victory, says that Christophe has taken every fort at the Mole, except St. George, that two vessels of Pettou's fleet were sunk in the Mole harbour, and a third ran ashore; that Christophe has now nine sail of armed vessels. Markets very bad; coffee scarce. 21st.

Arrived, sch'r Globe, Murphy, 20 days from La Guyra—coffee, indigo and hides, to Amos A. Williams & others.—Left there 1st instant, sch'r Fame, Davis, for Baltimore in 4 or 5 days; sch'r Sally, Beets, for do uncertain. Markets glutted with English goods and American produce. A congress of the representatives of the district of Caraccas is to assemble 4th Nov. to establish a form of government. Coro and Maracaybo have also come into the measures of Caraccas. Passed in the Bay 12 or 13 ships, brigs and sch'rs.

Also, brig Texale, Richardson, 34 days from Cadix, ballast, to James Bosley and Luke T. Heman. Left there 16th ult. ships Otho, Faber; Good Intent, New York; Charles & Harriott, Wilton, do; Eliza, Tobey, Newport; brig Cephalus, Norfolk, discharging; Saboe, Norfolk, Nablehead; Georgia, Southworth, arrived 13th Sept. 32 days from New York; Godfrey & Mary, Hazard, N. London, &c. Ship Augustus, Berry, of Baltimore, sailed in co with the Female. Capt. R. says that Cadiz is pretty much in the same state it has been for some time past; the French have no prospect of success. A French army of 10 or 15 thousand men is said to be at Malaga. There are about 10,000 English at Cadiz, and 6 sail of the line in the harbour. Off Cape St. Vincent, fell in with 70 sail of transports with troops from England for Cadiz and Gibraltar.—October 12, lat 35 33, long 66, spoke ship Rising Sun 6 days out from Baltimore, 17th, in lat 36 11 long 73 24, spoke the Ceres from Baltimore for St. Barts.
