I do therefore appoint Luke Tiernan his trustee, and order and adjudge that the said William Moore be discharged from imprisonment; and that by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some one of the public newspapers in the city of Baltimore, every other day for three months successively, before the seventeenth day of November next, he give notice to his creditors to appear before the said court at the court house of said county, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of said day, for the purpose of recommending a trustee for their benefit, and to show cause if any they have, why the said Wm.
