QUITO.

To avenge the murders perpetrated on the patriotic inhabitants of this city, by the mercenary troops sent thither from Lima, and to aid the revolutionary cause, the brave people of Carhagen, Santa Fe, Popayan, and Pastor, have sent thousands of volunteers.—The Supreme Junta of Santa Fe have solemnly declared three days of public mourning for the slain; and opened a subscription for the relief of the widows and orphans made by the massacre of the 3d of August. They proclaim their regret, that the *Franklin* and *Washington* of their revolution have not lived to behold its completion!

We cannot see, at present, all the motives and views of the leading revolutionists; but we flatter ourselves in to the belief, that a fire is kindled which can only be quenched by the blood of tyrants—or stayed by the acknowledgment of the rights of man. The following address is a sample of the revolutionary fervour:— **D. CARLOS MONTUFAR,** TO THE PEOPLE OF QUITO.

Inhabitants of Quito! The fatal moment so often dreaded by the just and upright, hath at length arrived, in which the unbridled rage of your infamous tyrants was to tear the entrails of an innocent people.

The victims sacrificed to the fury of a brutal soldiery, too well display the wounds of a bleeding country; and the assassinations of your citizens, will be the bloody mantle carried through the provinces, to arouse a country to vengeance.

Terror and Death have been the measures resorted to by a cruel and destroying government—let **TERROR** and **DEATH** be too our device. Chains and Dungeons have been the means they have used to stifle the groans of humanity crying for redress—let **CHAINS** and **DUNGEONS** then be the fate of our oppressors!

Verily hath an angel of peace, borne on the wings of desire from Europe, poured balm into your wounds. Tyrants, always haughty and insolent, are gratified with a cowardly triumph. They call themselves peaceable—they are pitiable as the tyger, with talons still dripping with the blood of your brethren. Unhappy people! your misfortunes have aroused the mild nature of Americans, and the consuming fire of vengeance now circulates in their veins. Raise your humbled heads; throw off your shackles and ashes; behold the firm heroes of our liberty extended in the dust—victims to the ferocious monsters, whom hell has disgorged for our destruction! Behold the streets! they are covered with the carcasses of your friends—Your wives disgraced; your children butchered! Behold with shame the prostrated dignities of the man whom you invested with so many honours last year. A whole country flies to your aid. It burns with the fire of liberty. Heroes spring up in our streets, and already a tyrant exists not in the north of our continent. The bloody names of a **Morales**, a **Quinaga**, and a **Salinas** point to their wounds and cry aloud for vengeance! Let us avenge ourselves. May the polluted blood of those who have precipitated them to the tomb, and the soil stained with their cruelties and crimes!

Extract to the editors, dated *New Orleans, October 8.* Last Sunday, the inhabitants of Bayou Sarah, headed by general Philemon Thomas attacked and took the fort and own of Baton rouge, and hoisted the American flag. Seven Spaniards were wounded in the engagement, one, the son of Mr. Grandpre mortally. The late governor, colonel Lassus [name not written very legibly] is now under an arrest. The revolutionists have sent a party of 50 men to the Bayou Manchac, to oppose the landing of some troops sent by governor Fouch of Pensacola, for the purpose of quelling the revolution in Feliciana. A gentleman who arrived here last evening from Mobile informed me that he met in Lake Pentchartrain a Spanish armed schooner with a captain and part of a company on board, bound to Bayou Manchac, from whence they were to march by land to Baton rouge. It is very probable that there has been an engagement between them and the 50 men sent to oppose them. I expect that the flame of the revolution will extend to every part of the Florida.

It is generally said this day, that there was a plan laid to set fire to this city

COMMERCIAL.

The following extracts from a Liverpool Price Current (Sept. 7) of colonial or foreign produce imported from the United States, are published to convince the most obstinate, that without a trade to the continent of Europe, we must lose heavily by a traffick confined to England, whose consumption of our products, or produce carried by us is considerable.

The remarks, written by English commission merchants, will be found to enforce and illustrate this truth.

EXTRACTS. The following Articles are admitted for exportation only, in British, American or other neutral ships.

The sale of foreign sugars continued nearly suspended, and prices exceeding by depesed until about the middle of last month, when we experienced a good deal of enquiry for the article in consequence of intelligence received from France, that Colonial produce would be admitted into that country upon payment of certain high duties. Some considerable purchases were made on this occasion, in the expectation of Licences being accordingly granted by the French government; but these expectations not being as yet realized, at least with respect to Sugars and Coffee, the sale of foreign sugars is become nearly as dull as before, and our future prospects for this article must be considered as very precarious.

The demand for Coffee has been so long almost suspended, that even the low prices quoted could not be realized for any quantity. For a few days indeed, about the middle of August, there was a partial demand for fine coffee, and several parcels found purchasers, at 90s. a 95s, and up to a 100s, in the hope of an export vent to France, &c. by means of licences. As however these do not yet make their appearance, and there is much uncertainty as to their being granted for colonial produce, (at least without such restrictions as will prevent their being generally acted upon,) the demand for coffee is now entirely suspended again, and the annexed quotations must be considered as nearly nominal.

The prices of Cocoa have remained for some time past almost entirely nominal, the demand for export being so completely suspended.

Barbadoes Ginger has met a pretty ready sale since our last Price Current at the annexed quotations. Jamaica Ginger is scarce and wanted.

Owing to the want of an export vent, the prices of Pimento have declined in the course of the past month, and the sale is exceedingly limited at the annexed prices.

The following articles, in American or other neutral ships, are admitted to be bonded for exportation only; in British ships, they are admitted for home consumption.

Such parcels of good St. Domingo mahogany as have been lately brought into the market have found a ready sale, at prices fully equal to those now quoted; and as this description is rather scarce, it is likely to support these prices, at least for the present. Cuba and Honduras wood are more plentiful, and the demand not so brisk.

Owing to the scarcity of Logwood, produced by the large shipments to France, &c. this article was on the advance, and in good demand for home use the greater part of the last month; for ten days past however the sale has been more limited; holders are beginning to be rather anxious to sell, and although the quantity brought by the Jamaica ships is small, we cannot expect the present high prices to be supported, unless the market is again animated by export orders.

Fustick has likewise been on the whole in request the past month, and prices steadily maintained; and as these have not been nearly so much enhanced beyond their ordinary value as Logwood was, by the export demand, we do not anticipate so material a reduction, though some depreciation may be looked for if we remain deprived of the export vent which we have lately enjoyed; and upon this subject it is difficult to speak with any certainty, for notwithstanding there are French licences actually arrived to permit the importation of dye-woods, indigo, drugs, &c. into France, they are so restricted, that at present there appears not much disposition to act upon them.

From the causes above stated, the sale of Indigo has been very dull of late, and prices have fallen again to about their ordinary rates, both here and in the London market. Spanish Indigos are indeed rather scarce at present, and as some licences for their exportation are actually arrived, we may probably have a revival in the demand shortly; but as East India Indigo rates so much lower, and it is understood that they will be admitted into France, and on the same terms as Spanish, we do not anticipate any extraordinary rise in the value of the latter.

The demand for hides has remained nearly suspended during the past month, and prices have again been drooping, owing to the continued suspension of export orders. As the stocks have been accumulating for some time past, and the holders begin to be more anxious to sell, the prices may still fall somewhat lower, unless the market is shortly relieved by a demand for export.
