(A COPY.) The preceding is a statement of facts taken from the protest of the captain. The affidavit of the mate speaks for it self The capture of the Laura Ann can only be considered as one the most profit gate of those acts of violence which have long since disgraced the British name. The arrogance, the ignorance, the false assertion, and final orders of capt Dashwood, must excite the indignation of every American who hears of these repeated violations of the rights of the flag of his country.

The sentence of Sir William Scott corresponds with that scale of justice that has long since governed the declsions of the admiralty court. It approves of the capture, and encourages the cap tors to repeat the outrage. In the judg-ment of Sir William Scott, there is no erime in forcing ten or a dozen seamen from a neutral vessel, and afterwards landing them in a strange country (with the means of subsistence) to shift for themselves. In the judgement of Sir William Scott, it is strictly just to arrest the progress of a neutral vessel under the most frivolous pretexts. In the judg. ment of Sir William Scott, there is no injustice in breaking up the voyage of a neutral, or in the total destruction of the whole property. These are events which Sir William Scott very calmly says grow out of the evils of war, and the neutral is bound to submit to them."

The Laura Ann was loaded entirely with Georgia cotton. After a most dis-astrous voyage, she had a fair prospect of a happy termination to it. If she had arrived at Stralsund, her cargo would have sold instantly at 50 groots banco This would have yielded in London (to which place the proceeds were ordered to be remitted) 2s. 8d. sterling, or near ly 60 cents per pound The gross sale of the cargo in its damaged state will average about 7d. sterling, or 13 cents per pound; which, after paying the charges, will amount to a total loss.
