

Wearied with temporizing to spare the effusion of blood, and perceiving that nothing could be compared to my patience and bounty if it was only the hardness of heart and inflexibility of the factious, I had decided on the fate of this criminal place, as soon as the two chiefs who successively commanded there, had bit the dust; two of their vessels of war destroyed, in the road offer only their weak carcasses; a considerable quantity of cannon, mortars, munitions and provisions of all kinds, is the result of your labors, the price of your valor, and the men who issued forth from the extremity of the South, to plunder you of your most precious effects, forced to surrender at discretion, have known that your clemency is equal to your valor.

Such is always the reward of true courage! Nothing can resist it, because it is nurtured by the fidelity of its chief, guided by honor and inspired with a love of country. Soldiers, and you brave marines who have rivalled the land forces throughout—You whose efforts have mastered the winds, the currents and the waves in a cruise which will be the admiration of the most experienced mariners: The new splendor which your glorious exploits have just reflected on the arms of your chief is your best eulogium; in fine, the zeal, constancy, loyalty, fidelity and intrepidity that you have displayed in a hundred battles, necessitated by the most inconceivable rage, are my pride and glory: Yes, I recognize in you, intrepid warriors, founders of liberty & independence; and I glory more than once during this campaign in leading you on to battle. It is pleasing to me to declare, that you have deserved well of your country, and it will be a solace to my heart to decree honourable rewards to those of you who are the most distinguished.

But this is little else than illustrating the career of heroes; there is another virtue, another kind of glory of which we ought to give the example.

You have seen these furious supporters of error, these obstinate partisans who are a shame to reason and nature—You have seen them, I say, the unfortunate children of the south basely abandoned and betrayed by their comrades; after having tasted of the most bitter cup of human disgrace; after having been forced to lay down their arms, to bend before me, acknowledge their errors and implore my forgiveness; they thought to find in me an enraged conqueror; they expected to read in my irritated countenance their sentence of death! The ungrateful men! they have witnessed nothing but my compassion and the tears their repentance have drawn from my eyes. You Soldiers, softened by this example, have nobly shared with them your tents, provisions and garments; they have in you none but brothers; and your arms have carefully borne their sick and wounded to the hospital, there to be attended and taken care of as the instance of your companions. What say I? The 9th regiment, that same which was the first to raise the standard of revolt, as also the wreck of the 16th, 18th, 21st, 22d, 23d and 24th, made prisoners, are this day astonished to take rank in the armies of Hayti; but let their surprise cease, when they know, that in inflicting chastisement a father is always a father; and let them bring to their recollection these words of the common father of mortals:—“there is more joy in heaven over one lost sheep which is found again, than over a hundred which have never gone astray.”

Let this characteristic of magnanimity soften the hearts of those who yet for moment discord or excess imposture: Let them learn finally that it is good to sacrifice private resentments to the general weal: let them consider that the vile agents of the French government, like unto famished vultures, only watch the moment to spring upon their prey; let them reflect that the vessel of Independence on board of which all have embarked must save itself or perish with its passengers; and that to bring her into a good harbor, it is glorious to rally under brethren who know how to fight, conquer and pardon. For myself, convinced that our divisions are the joy and hope of our enemies; persuaded that this is the only country which now offers itself to freemen; certain by experience that the interests of the blacks and mulattoes are inseparable; instructed by sufficient data that our common enemy are weaving new webs to render our quarrels endless; I call heaven and man to witness, that be the sacrifice what it may, my only endeavour shall be to reassemble the children of Hayti under my paternal shield. Confiding in my own resources, on the legitimacy of my cause, and strong in the ascendancy which they give me, I fear not to renew the general amnesty which has been already offered for the welfare of the state, the only object of my ambition.

But if it be desirable that a part of the Haytians yet scattered abroad, return from the errors and expiate the evils of many years by a moments repentance; if it be of public interest that the members of the great family unite for the despair and dismay of our tyrants; it is not the less necessary to preserve an attitude which becomes men who having done much, know that much remains to be done.

Soldiers—You will return to your garisons and respective cantonments; to repose from the toil you have experienced; carry with you there the spirit of order, subordination and discipline, the pledge of victory. I will distribute the prize of valor to those who have signalized themselves by great actions. Your corps will be completed, new clothed and equipped; enjoy then in peace the fruits of your laurels, and be ready at

the first signal to complete the triumph of the legitimate authority.
