d'armes. The British troops have been actively employed in destroying the corn mills on Capa. It is generally thought that ere long a battle must inevitably take place. The French rob, plunder and murder, whenever they make their appearance. The men of the 24th Portuguese regiment on the 29th ult. entered the French service, and the 4th Inst. nearly the whole had deserted, and joined at head quarters. A division of six thousand militia, under gen. Meller, is at Chaves; Silveira is on the upper banks of the Douro; and gen. Trant in the neighbourhood of St. J. de Pasqueira, so that if the French get near Vizen, they will be flanked by the militia, who are very good troops. The French now have the whole of their force in the vicinity of Pinhel; including Regoier and Junot's divisions it is estimated at about 93,000 men; the latter is with Mustafa, who can bring 60,000 troops into the field. Should he advance against lord Wellington, his lordship will, no doubt, retire to the Ponte de Marcella. We every hour expect to hear of this having taken place.

It is said that 8000 troops from France have entered Navarre. During the last four months Junot's division has experienced a loss of upwards of ten thousand men by desertion, sickness, and the sword. About 3500 troops have been sent from Salamanca to the Asturias.

We have just learned that on the 6th our advanced posts were at Francos, and lord Wellington near Vizen. On the 27th, two line of battle ships and a frigate that were blocked up in Cherburg, made their escape, when the Donnegal and Revenge were a few miles off that port. They were watched by two of our sloops of war. Information of this was yesterday received at the Admiralty, and orders were sent to Plymouth for 3 sail of the line to follow them. The Hero and Mars were also ordered from Spithead to cruise off Cherburg; from the state of the weather there is every chance of their being taken.

The exact amount of the naval force which the enemy have already equipped in the Scheldt is 13 sail of the line, two frigates, two corvettes, and 60 gun-boats. Sir Edward Pellew is watching them with eleven sail of the line—Commodore Owen commands a detached squadron of frigates, gun-brigs, &c. in shore.

A gentleman who quitted Holland on Monday, describes the situation of the merchants there as most calamitous. A decree had been published by Bonaparte, signing one fifth of any commercial property concealed, to the informer who should discover it, and one-tenth to the Douaniers concerned in the seizure of it. The consequence was, that servants in the closest connection with the proprietors had turned informers, and a large quantity of the effects that had been buried was brought to light.

The following resolutions have been adopted for effecting the deposits at the Bank of Amsterdam:

- 1. The debtors of the duties of 40 or 50 per cents, may take the funds which they wish to deposit in the bank, for payment of the said duties. 2. The cashiers shall receive the money, shall count it, and deposit it in their bank, under their guarantee. 3. The duty for the counting and deposit, for the cashiers as well as the bank, is fixed for the whole, at one-eighth per cent. Done at our Palace at Amsterdam, Sept. 20, 1810.

Yesterday arrived in London lieutenant Leith, charged with dispatches of great importance from the governor general of India. He came passenger in the William Pitt, extra ship, which left Madras on the 8th of May, when every thing was in a state of the greatest tranquillity. Lord Minto was preparing to return to Bengal.

Great exertions and incessant labour have been bestowed by the enemy to repair the works in the Island of Waacereh, which is now in a good state of defence. They are not, however, free from apprehensions for their safety, in case of a serious attack. The fleet under sir Edward Pellew made its appearance a few days since off the Douro Channel—a circumstance which excited no small degree of alarm for the safety of their new fleet, and filled the inhabitants with terror.

Cordeva, in South America, where the Corsican patizan, Linders, is at the head of 1800 Gallo Spaniards, about to resist the revolutionaries, is the chief town in the province of Tucuman, in the region of Paraguay. It has about 800 miles N. W. from Buenos Ayres, near the frontier of Chili, and is in the direct road from the former to Peru; from whose inhabitants the revolutionary party expected the most important co-operation.

MR MUNGO PARKE. The following is a copy of a letter to lord Moira, upon the pleasing subject of the above enterprising traveller:— Frenchchurch Buildings, Sept. 27, 1810. My Lord,

It affords me particular satisfaction to be enabled to acquaint your lordship, that I have received authentic information from a very particular friend of mine, lately arrived here from Mogadore, that Mr. Mungo Parke, the African traveller, was seen about the month of March last, eight days journey, or about 120 miles east of Tombuctoo. Some slaves from Wanagra, who were lately conducted to Mogadore for sale, passed Mr. Parke on their journey, and it was ascertained that he had

Left there 16th October, sch'r Fly, Gold, Baltimore uncertain; brig Camaleon, Gildes, do. in 7 days; sch'r Hope, Harper, Alexandria, in 6 days; brig Liberty, Anderson, Boston, 10 days; brig Sterling, Moffit, Philadelphia, next day; sch'r Charles, Hill, Norfolk, 10; brig Charles, Boston, 8 days; schooner Sally, Williams, of New York for Norfolk in 5 days; ship Rambler, Rich, sailed the day before for New York. From the 16th to the 23d experienced heavy gales off Capa Canaveral fell in with and spoke the ship Rambler for New York, and returned for Philadelphia, both from Havana.
