origin. The truth of the case does not admit of this plea. Her pride would as ver condescend to make use of it, did not her abject beseness forge it, for her use and force it into popular circulation. Let us recur to the undeniable evidence of

In November, 1792, M. Chauvelin, the French minister then in London, re-monstrated against the detention, in British ports, of neutral vessels laden with grain, as contrary to the law of nations, and to the statutes of England. So forc ible and well founded was this remon strance in the minds of the British mini sters, that they applied to parliamens for an act of indemnity. Captures and de-tentions of this nature were, however, continued through the winter of 1792-3.

On the 5th of July, 1793, Mr T. Pinkney, then our minister at London, communicated to our government, that lord Grenville had avowed that the captures of neutral vessels, as directed by the British orders in council of June 8, 1793, (now said to be retaliatory on the French decree of May 9, 1793.) were fully understood both by Russia and Great Britain, to be within the intention of the convention between them, signed at London, March 23, 1791

The British orders of June 3, are expressly called additional orders England did not pretend to justify them on the ground of the French decree, of a prior date. On the contrary, lord Grenille, and Mr. Hammond, her minister in this country, contended, that the convention with Russia and the captures in pursuance of it were justifiable by the law of nations.

The convention with Russia, to which I have alluded, was of similar import with the treaties formed by England the same year with the emperor of Germany, the kings of Prussia, Spain, Portugal, Sardinia, and Sicily, and the princes of Hesse, Baden and Darmstadt; and for which the nations concerned, with the exception of England, the head of the confederacy of 1793, have since made serious atonements.

The following are the leading articles of the treaty with Spain, signed at Aranjuez, May 25, 1793.—As was observed in the Boston Centinel, then watchful of its country's rights, " they are all of the same tenor

" Art. IV. Their said majesties en gage reciprocally to shut their ports against French vessels; nor to permit that there shall in any case be experte from their ports for France, either war like or naval stores, or wheat or other grains, salted meat or other provisions; and to take every other measure in their power, to distress the trade of France and reduce her by that means to just

conditions of peace.

"Art. V. Their said majesties also engage, the present war being gen ratty interes ing to every civilized state, to unite all their efforts in order to frevent those flowers, which do not take fart in the said war, from affording, in consequence of their neutrality, any protection, direct or indirect, on the seas, or in the ports of France, to the commerce and property of the French.

"Art. VII. If either of the two high contracting parties should be attacked, molested or disturbed in any of his dominions, rights, possession or interests, at whatever time or in whatever manner it might be, by sea or by land, in conse quence and in hatred of the articles or stipulations contained in the present treaty, or of the measures to be taken by the said high contracting parties in virtue of this treaty, the other contracting party engages to succour and to make common cause with him, in the manner stipulated in the foregoing articles "

Here the necessity was certainly not on the part of England—the object was to force upon France the full weight of

On the 17th of June 1793, under the head of an act for the better regulation of his majesty's navy, was entered upon the records of the British parliament, this remarkable section—not of law; but rather of the repeal of all law; and which may with propriety be called the death warrant of the British constitution neutral

" Sect. 35. Provided, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed to restrain his majesty, his heirs or suc cossors from giving such further rules and directions from time to time to his respective courts of admiralty and vice admiralty, for the adjudication and con demnation of prizes, as by his majesty, his heirs and successors, with the advice of his or their privy council, shall be thought necessary and proper "

We have before seen, that by long es tablished usage, the prize ceurts in Eng land were bound to proceed according to the universal law of nations and particular treatics with the state, whose rights were in question; and that by the funda mental principles of the constitution the king had no more right to interfere with his rules for decision in his courts of admiralty, than in his courts of common law.

Here we find a standing act of indemnity for his ministers and judges—a sweeping absolution for all the robberies that his majesty, his heirs and successors may order on the high seas, and his judges' sanction by the aules to be "given from time to time for their di

This ford stain yet remains upon the records of the British parliament. In point of remedy, it is in vain we urge; that upon every sound principle of the British constitution and of legal reason ing, this section is absolutely null and void; that in addition to the right of is suing regulations and rules of capture to the navy, which the king possessed as

supreme executive of the realin, it virtually and formally delegates to him, his heirs and successors, the right of legis-lating and of judging in all maritime causes where the rights of other nations are concerned, and makes the pageantry of judges and the forms of adjudication in his prize courts a solemn mockery of justice—an aggravated insult added to a

palpable and unpardonable injury. This high handed innovation has become in practice, as it was unquestiona bly intended in theory, the law of Great Britain. Blind must be the intellect that cannot perceive in this act of parliament the orders in council, which preceded have followed it, and the practical explanation given to this new system-s settled determination to persevere in the arbitrary and absolute controll of our commerce. Obdurate indeed must be that mind which can justify or palliate the perhdious assumption
