ricutral rights practised by England; and easy George the 3d, have nothing more formally pledged himself to the world, to do to preserve appearances of what is that this decree should be considered as the fundamental law of his empire, until England should acknowledge that the rights of war are the same on land as at sea. Never before was the pride of man more strongly pledged to persevere in the course prescribed to himself. By what potent charm has the iron heart of Napsicon been softened? What has induced this mighty conqueror to step short and alter his premeditated course? —Something more powerful than all the armies he ever yet opposed—something to him more fearful than all the instruments of terror and destruction that he ever yet met in his destined course of victory. It was the God of Nature and of justice, speaking to him from the hearts of his oppressed subjects in the unuttorable anguish of their injured social feelings—from his plient allies, in doleful remonstrance, that threatened gathering dangers to his fortune and to his fame; and above all, from the firm and intelligent ministers of America, the only representatives of the rights of the peaceful and independent world in dis tracted Europe. It is this which has appalled the sout heart of the boasted son of Mars and of fortune; that has in duced him to stop short in his bold career; to retrace his steps; and to yield to his haughty and more persevering competitor the prize of victory in the is is pertinent to enquire in this place

-From what causes does England adhere to her system of hostility against our neutral rights, with so much more pertinacity than her antagonist? This question is partly answered by the view we have taken of the maritime pride and spirit of domination that has become the ruling passion of both political parties in England; the usurped power of the crown, assuming to dictate by eshinet orders to the pensioners of its favours, its submission according its submissive agents in the prize courts and the artful subterfuge of parliamen tary sanction, to which, however illegal, both ministers and judges may resort as a pledge of indemnity for all maritime transgressions, past, present, and future, at least as sacred and binding in their fa-your, as that henour, which is but too well observed among thieves.

By the principles of the Roman, or civil law, recognized in this respect in their fullest extent in France, the whi of the emperor is law. On him of course rests the greatest possible degree of re sponsibility — This responsibility was never shunned by Napoleon When pressed by the complaints of his subjects, the intimations of his allies, and the unanswerable remonstrances of America, neither his laws nor his power permitted him to point to his scape goat ministers. or pre absolved judges, as the causes or cure of the evil. Whatever odium at-tended his measures, he knew he must bear it upon his own shoulders in the face of the world. Its weight became too heavy for even him to sustain, and he flung from him the irksome load with the best grace imaginable.

Far otherwise in England. There,

all directly or indirectly share the plun der of the despoiled rights of neutrals but none are responsible in practi al effect, whatever, may be the nature or extent of their offences against other na-

By the constitution of England the king can do no wrong, and is of course absolved from all personal responsibility. Look to his ministers, who we once considered as answerable for his measures however ill advised, and they are secure in infamy by a perpetual act of indeninity. Go to your last resort for legal redress, those venerable sanctuaries where Justice, impartial and inflexible, once sat personified in the judges of courts of maritime jurisdiction, throughout the British realm, and you are insulted with the mock-show of automata, placed upon the bench, (avowedly as deputies of the lords commissioners of admiralty.) and moved at will by the arch jugglers be-hind the curtain at the cabinet council of St. James. and pre absolved deputies receive, as he generally does in course, his master's orders in council as the RULE to govern his conscience, he is indemnified by act of parliament. If his conscience is not sufficiently mollified by royal bounty to conform in all cases to royal instructions, common law comes in for his protection. He is presumed to have acted with honest intentions and is not to be impeached for an error in julgment.

Thus has the British nation, once so celebrated for its justice and its love of freedom, deliberately, by its representatives in parliament, broken down one of its strongest barriers against tyranny and injustice, presented by its boasted constitution, and opened the door to unlimi ted depredation at the will of the cabinet, while it has excluded all personal responsibility, so far as other nations are concerned, both in the executive and ju-

dicial departments.

We find then on examination that the king of England, however circumscribed in his authority where his own subjects are concerned, is vested with as uncon trouled power for every purpose of wielding his immense navy and annoying the rights of neutral commerce, as the most despotic tyrant that ever reigned With this unlimited power, there never existed the man so deaf to the voice of justice, so collous to a sense of safety and of sname, as to have borne up under the odium of its flagrant abuses, du ring the last eighteen years of the reign of the present king of England, had he stood, like the emperor of France, be-fore his nation and the world, upon his own personal responsibility. The keep-

forinciples of the minor outlages against ers of the honour and the person of good lost, and to retain what remains for their own private use, than to play off the mi-serable remnant of their nominal sovereign in such a manner as to amuse the credulity, pamper the avarice, and gratify the unsocial pride of the English pation.

The success of an appeal to the honor of this king has been tried by our government. The experiment has shown how little we have to expect from the rectitude of this shattered piece of moonsmitten majesty. His ministers had some use for his ravings, but none for his reason, and they know how to tune his intellect to their discordant purposes

with America.
With this view of the organization and disposition of the British, cabinet and courts of admiralty, it is but too manilest that if ever we gain a voluntary and amicable recognition of our rights, by that nation, is must be by a popular appeal to its misguided honesty, urged by the united intelligence and patriotism of America.

Let us then avail ourselves of the common channel of Intercourse from mind to mind between the two nations. Let the language which we speak, so far as we are concerned, be devoted to its dar-ling native themes. Let it preserve its characteristic discrimination of moral excellence and turpitude, and lose nothing of its stern severity in the cause of liber ty, law and universal justice. If the press have been degraded to the convement vehicle of willul and pernicious popular delusion on those important subjects where a correct popular under-s anding is so essential to the permanent interest and hopour of freemen; let it make stonement for the vile abuse, and bear to England these substantial maxims and salutary admonitions, which are worthy the high pretensions of the boast od defenders of the liberty of the world.

THE VOLUNIEER.

Napoleon, though he suffers directly by our submission to the abuse of British impressment, has never been hardy enough to hazard his reputation upon the retaliation of this first and most enormous offence that blackens the history of the presentage.
