HOUSE OF DELEGATES

COMMUNICATED FOR THE WEEK

THURSDAY, Nov. 8, 1810.

Mr. Swearingen, delegate from Frederick, appeared qualified and took his seat.

The following permissions were asked for and obtained:— Leave to tax bank stock, and for other purposes.

Leave to bring in a bill entitled, an act to confirm an act passed Nov. session 1809, entitled an act to repeal and abolish the forty-fifth article of the constitution, and form of government.

Leave to bring in a bill concerning joint rights and obligations. Leave to bring in a bill to appoint the levy court by the people.

On motion of Mr. Forwood, leave given to bring in a bill to withdraw the salaries from the militia officers and to make some provision for the privates.

Mr. Bowles from the committee of claims, delivers a report which was read.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, leave given to bring in a bill entitled an additional supplement to the act entitled an act, respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts.

On motion of Mr. Stevens, leave given to bring in a bill to confirm an act passed at November session 1809, entitled an act to alter all such parts of the constitution and form of government of this state, as relate to voters and qualifications of voters.

On motion by Mr. Bland, leave given to bring in a bill to prevent fraud.

On motion by Mr. Archer, leave given to bring in a bill entitled an act concerning liens.

On motion by Mr. Bland, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to regulate judicial proceedings in civil cases.

The speaker laid before the house a letter from the Auditor General, enclosing the Western Shore treasurers' account, as charged on the auditors books, to the first November, 1810, and an estimate of the state debt to the same period.

On motion by Mr. Bland, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, a further supplement to an act entitled an act, for amending and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans, and other representatives of deceased persons.

On the second reading of the report of the committee to appoint rules for the present session—

On motion of Mr. Herbert, the question was put that the 38th article be struck out. Determined in the negative. The question was put that the house concur with the said report. Determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Archer delivers a petition from William Gilbert of Harford, praying for a law to pass to have a deed recorded to him from R. G. Hampton.

Mr. Emory delivers a petition from Charles Shewall of Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, praying a supplement to the act for the sale of the real estate of William O'Bryan.

Mr. Archer delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford, praying that justices of the peace may be restrained from attending at the places where spirituous liquors are sold, for the purpose of administering justice.

Mr. Dorsey delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Charles, praying they may be authorized to erect a church on the public square in Charles Town, commonly called Port Tobacco.

Mr. Dorsey delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Charles, praying for an act of incorporation to open a canal on Zachiah Swamp.

Mr. Groome delivers a petition from Edward Wingate, praying that he may be relieved from certain lands which he has relinquished to him.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from Margaret Wordall of Baltimore county, praying a divorce.

Mr. Bowles delivers a petition from F. Green, praying an advance of 600 dollars on account of his salary, to be allowed him on the civil list for the ensuing year, to enable him to discharge his contracts for his paper, &c. for the work of the present session.

Mr. Street delivers a petition from J. McComas of Harford, praying that the damages awarded him by a jury for a road running through his land, with eight per cent interest thereon, may be levied on said county.

Mr. C. Hall delivers a petition from Geo. Jones of Kent county, praying for a special act of insolvency, which was read and referred.

Mr. Welsh delivers a petition from Edward Nicholson, of Kent county, praying for a special act of insolvency.

LEXINGTON, Oct. 27.

The important suit of Innis vs. Street, for a libel published in the Western World, whilst Mr. Street was editor of that paper, has at length been decided in Jessamine Circuit Court. After a patient hearing of all the testimony, and arguments of counsel, which occupied a whole week, the Jury on Wednesday returned a verdict for the Plaintiff—damages \$50 dollars.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.

A meeting was held last evening at the Coffee-House, of ship owners, importers, and other merchants, interested in a non-intercourse with Great Britain; for the purpose of consulting on the propriety of soliciting information from the government relative to the operation of the law alluded to in the President's proclamation. After some discussion, it was concluded to be inexpedient to apply to government at the present time.

We are indebted to a highly respectable commercial house, for the following communications from Amsterdam.

FRENCH DECREE.

I. That all American vessels which may arrive in the ports of France, previous to the 1st of November, will be judged under the decrees of Berlin and Milan only, not under any other.

II. That the decree of the 23d of March, 1810, was repealed from the moment that the French government heard of the expiration of the non-intercourse law.

III. That all American vessels which shall not have suffered their flag to be denationalized by submitting to the British orders in council, shall be received hereafter without difficulty in the ports of France, and depart in the same manner.

IV. That the emperor has given licences to American vessels, and that it is the only foreign flag that has obtained them, &c.

V. That American vessels shall be admitted in France whether loaded on account of Frenchmen or Americans.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12.

LATEST FROM CORUANA.

The brig Squirrel, Wing, arrived at the port yesterday afternoon in 30 days from Coruana. Left there October 9.—Capt. Wing states that the day before he sailed, great firings and rejoicings took place at Coruana, in consequence of some news said to be received from Portugal. He did not learn the particulars.

Paragraphs from the Exchange Coffee-House Books.

Brig Thomas, Davis, long passage from Gottenburg for Plymouth, has arrived at Provincetown. The Thomas spoke Oct 16, to the eastward of the Grand Bank, sch'r Hero, Gorry, from St. Petersburg for Marblehead, having on 8th been run foul of by an English brig, and had seven of her top timbers stove in; supposing the vessel was sinking, capt. G. leaped overboard to get into the brig, but got under her bows and was drowned—the mate, who was along side of him, was saved. The Hero leaking badly was unable to carry much sail.

The brig Gleaner, Lewis, from Liverpool for Boston, was driven into Wellfleet Bay, during the snow storm on Friday last. She lost cables and anchors.

In the late snow storm the brig Cincinnati, Sargent, from St. Petersburg for Boston, went ashore near Race Point; cargo saved; vessel expected not to be got off. Captain S left at St. Petersburg August 30, the Thomas, of Duxbury—Sailed from Gottenburg Sept. 17 in company with ship Montgomery, Orme, of Portsmouth, for London. Left brig Exert, Elwell, of Boston.

Three Friends, Downs, 45 days from Liverpool for Boston, went ashore near the Cincinnati, and bilged, cargo running out.—Spoke Oct 17, lat 43, lon 50, in 35 fathoms water, ship Arno, Marchant, from Boston for Hull Oct 25, lat 43, lon 58 30, a sch'r from Eastport, (no doubt the Gardner) making her way for the Western Islands, with the loss of her bowsprit, and part of her deck load.

CITY OF ROME.

Extract from the report of the commissioners appointed to lay out and survey a plot contemplated to be called the "CITY OF ROME."

At a meeting of the counsellors of the City of Rome, held in the city of Philadelphia, the 30th of October, 1810, the following extract from the report of the commissioners, was ordered to be published in two or more newspapers of the said city.

The commissioners report, that agreeably to the order of the counsellors, they have proceeded to the city of Rome, where they arrived on the 21st of October, 180, and on that day fixed upon the site and marked the most eligible spot for and determined the course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lehigh on the turnpike leading to Wilkesbarre, and found the distance from said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union Square, to be five miles. Said bridge is about 100 miles from the city of Philadelphia, and 17 miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the east side of the Susquehanna. The centre of Union Square aforesaid, is situated on a gentle rise of ground, gradually elevated a few feet above the adjoining square. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Rome, throughout the whole extent, appears to be excellent, abounding with streams of wholesome water, the principle of which is called "Trout Creek," which affords water sufficient to turn mills of any description. The timber is valuable, consisting of sugar Maple, Black Cherry, Black Birch, White Ash, Spruce and Birch. The road (which is now engaged to be cut from the turnpike to Union Square,) is surveyed through a pleasant tract of country, and a surveyor is now engaged to lay out all the streets.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of Maryland, did, by an act passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, and titled, an act to reduce into one, the several acts of Assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, and that the Governor and Council, after having received the returns of the elections of the members to represent this state in the congress of the United States, should endeavor to ascertain the number of votes given for each and every person voted for as a member to congress aforesaid respectively, and that thereupon declare by proclamation, signed by the governor, the name of the elected person or persons duly in each respective district. We, in pursuance of the direction of the said act, do by this our Proclamation declare, that by the return made to us, it appears, that Philip Stuart Esquire, was elected for the first district—Joseph Kent, Esquire, was elected for the second district—Philip Barton Key, Esquire, was elected for the third district—Samuel Ringgold, Esquire, was elected for the fourth district; Alexander McKim and Peter Little, Esquires, were elected for the fifth district; John Montgomery, Esquire was elected for the sixth district; John Brown of Nathan, Esquire, was elected for the seventh district; and Charles Goldsborough, Esq. was elected for the eighth district.

Given in council, at the city of Annapolis, under the great seal of the state of Maryland, this fifth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ten, and of the independence of the United States of America, the thirty-first.
