of some personal dislike or animosity on the part of the writer towards Mr. Gal-latin. We shall, according to our for-mer promise, which we here take the

pportunity to repeat, renew our investigation of the conduct of the secretary of the treasury, and this is peculiarly the place where this notice should be given, because he is at the bottom of the machinery, which is now in motion, for the U. S. bank charter, as may be seen by many late movements as well as by his own declarations

But it is possible that some one may say, with equal plausibility, that the ob servations in this paper adverse to the renewal of the United States bank charter arise from some personal dislike or animosity towards that institution or those who are concerned in its direction.

We think it therefore proper to anticipate this kind of logic, by declaring that the bank of the United States never refused us any favour-never abridged our discounts—never threw out our notes; so much for the favours of the bank; and as to the directors, unless it be the name of the president, concerning whom, if we could have any sort of feel ings, they mus be those of respect ra ther than any other; and the name of the cashier, we could not at this moment name one of them without the aid of some book of reference; with neither president or cashier have we the least ac quaintance, and the latter we should not

Having no personal motives on either side, the question comes before us as naked public question, and as such we shall discuss it, with liberality, but with firmness, alike indifferent to power or to scurrility. The flowns of opulent in solence and the vulgarity of mercenary sycophancy, shall not change nor is fluence the discussion. We object to the renewal of the charter of the U States bank-

1. Upon the ground that its charter is about to expire, and the obligation enter ed into by the public has been fulfi led.

2. Because the limitation was a suffi c'ent warning to the bank to arrange its affairs, and no excuse can be u. ged by commercial body for a failure in exact

3. Because the charter is fundamentally bad, pernicious in its past operation, and fraught with greater mischief. Because two thirds of the stock is held in foreign countries, through which

an influence has been exercised of the most fatal nature to a free people.

5 Because the profits of two thirds of the capital stock is cutried out of the cir

culation of the United States to enrich those who use their influence in hostility to our government. 6 Because, beside the profit upon the

bank stock, the deposit of the public re venue of the United States, being limited to that bank, all the advantages de rived from the public money, go in the proportion of two thirds out of our circulation, and to enrich persons adverse

7. Because the influence of that bank has been, from its first establishment, subservient to British interests and adverse to American interests.

8. Because its influence has been fa tally employed on many public occasions, particularly the British treaty, the cmbargo, and the general system of our policy framed to protect us from British aggression.

9. Because its influence, has been exercised in our local elections.

10. Because instead of being employed as a medium of commercial accommodation for the reciprocal advantage of the community and the proprietors, it has been employed as a political engine, to favour such as would abandon the interests of popular representative govern ment; and to repress or to obstruct the pursuits in society of men who were devoted to the principles of liberty and independence, as defined in the de claration of 1776 11. Because it is imminently danger

ous to the security and independence of this government, that a body, two thirds of whom are foreigners resident in fo reign countries, should have the power of holding a certain number of citizens in vassalage, under the name of direc

12. Because it is particularly danger ous when the government of the country has to make loans with a body prone to a partial use of its influence in favour of a foreign nation.

13. Because, from the attempts now making to alarm society with the apprehension of a general bankruptcy, they either shew that they Wink it firacticable or wish the people to think so; -and if it were practicable, that reason, of all others, should forever prohibit the dura tion of any such power in any body so constituted; but if it be not true, (and that it is not true time will prove) then the very effort is a fraud calculated to put in jeopardy the interests and property of weak minds: and no part of the community should be suffered to exer cise a power so detestable and injurious to the rest.

14. Because the same pernicious influence is conspicuous throughout the United States wherever branches are established, in some of which the abuse | boarded from the U.S. ship J ha Adams has become a nuisance, odious and abominable, to the best portion of society, as in Charleston and Orleans.

15. Because the best men have been removed from the direction, in order to make way for some of the worst-the fault of the former being attachment to his country, the merit of the latter hostility to the government

16 Because the whole system of the patronage of this bank is carried into channels hostile to American interests.

lic safety, and to the general prosperity. and to establish confidence in all useful banking insitutions, that this bank, which has had so many years of prosperous trade, should wind up its affairs, in order that the public should know how far it has fulfilled, or how far it has executed its trust; of which there are various opinions, which never can be reconciled but by a clear winding up.

18. Because the example of the abuges of banking in Great Britain, by its government, ought to warn the people the United States against its fatal influ

cnce 19. Because the connexion of United States bank a ock with British inserests at this time, when that nation is threatened with bankruptcy, ought to induce us to guard against its fatal consequences.

20. Because in the event of a war in defence of the national rights, the existence of foreign influence in that bank would paralyze the public energies, and prove more fatal to public exertion than an array of 100,000 enemies in the heart of the land.
