

airs, and the said justices, together with an attested copy of the notices by which such meeting was called, the said schedule, and the said list of creditors, shall set down in writing the examination of the said creditor, and any witnesses that may be produced by any of the parties, and also take down and transcribe, as a part of the said examination, any deed, account or writing, which may be produced and verified by oath or affirmation, of any of the attending parties, or by one or more competent witnesses, and after the said examination shall be closed; or if no creditors or their agents attend and examine the insolvent as aforesaid, and if the said justices shall be satisfied by legal testimony, that the said debtor hath resided two whole years next preceding within this state, the said attending justices shall administer to the said debtor the following oath or affirmation, as the case may require, to wit: "I, A. B. do swear, or solemnly, sincerely and truly declare and affirm, that I will deliver up for the benefit of my creditors, to any trustee that may be appointed by the county court, all my property that I have or claim any title to, or interest in, and all debts, rights and claims, which I have or am any way entitled to, in possession, reversion or remainder, the necessary wearing apparel and bedding of myself and family excepted, and that I have not directly or indirectly, at any time sold, conveyed, lessened or disposed of, for the use or benefit of any person or persons, or intrusted, any of my money, or other property, debts, rights or claims, thereby to defraud my creditors, or any of them, or to secure the same to receive or expect any profits, benefits or advantages thereby," all which proceedings the said justices shall certify and transmit into the clerk's office of the county court of the county in which such meeting was held, within twenty days after such meeting was held, under the penalty of fifty dollars, to be recovered by the said debtor, or his or her creditors who will sue for the same.

II. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for any creditor of any person, who hath or shall have been actually imprisoned for sixty days and upwards, upon execution in any civil action, or for the creditor of any person who shall suffer any note or bill of exchange, which shall be made negotiable at any bank established by a law of this state, to be protested, and remain unpaid by the space of ten days, to apply in person or by attorney, to the county court, or any judge thereof, in case such creditor or the said attorney shall be apprehensive that the estate or effects of such debtor will be wasted or embezzled, and upon such application, and an affidavit being made by such creditor, before any judge or justice of the peace of this state, that such person is justly indebted to such creditor in a certain sum of money then due, and to be specified in said affidavit, not less than one hundred dollars, and that such debtor is in prison on execution issued against him or her in some civil action, and has been so imprisoned for sixty days and upwards, or that such debtor hath suffered his note or bill of exchange, so as aforesaid negotiable, to be protested, and to remain unpaid by the space of ten days; the said court or judge, shall cause the said debtor or to be summoned to appear, or be brought before them or him, to show cause, if any he or she hath, why a meeting of his or her creditors should not be called according to the provisions herein prescribed; and if the court or judge, on hearing the allegations of the parties, should be of opinion that there is no just cause why the said debtor should not be compelled to call a meeting of his or her creditors, then and in that case the said court or judge, shall order at least thirty days notice to be given in manner aforesaid of the time and place when the creditors may meet, and such petitioning creditor shall give at least three days notice to two or more justices of the peace to attend such meeting, and the same shall be in all things regulated and conducted as herein before prescribed; and the said court or judge, may release such debtor from imprisonment, on his entering into bond, with such penalty and security as the said court or judge, may release such debtor from imprisonment, on his entering into bond, with such penalty and security as the said court or judge shall direct and approve, to appear at the said meeting, and in all things to conform to the provisions of this act; but if the said debtor shall remain in prison until the day appointed for the said meeting, the said attending justices may issue a warrant, under their hands, directed to the sheriff or other officer in whose custody said debtor is, commanding him to have the said debtor at said meeting; and the said justices shall certify the proceedings of the said meeting to the county court in manner aforesaid.

III. And be it enacted, That the county court, upon the proceedings of such meeting being certified and transmitted as aforesaid, shall name such person as a majority of the creditors in value, their agents or attorneys, shall recommend, to be a trustee for the benefit of the creditors of such debtor, or in case of the non-attendance of the creditors, or of their not making a recommendation, the county court shall name such person as they may think proper, to be a trustee; and the property, real, personal and mixed, together with all debts, rights and claims, which such debtor hath, or may be in any way entitled to, or which he or she may lawfully depart withal at the time of calling the meeting of his or her creditors as aforesaid, reserving to the wife of such debtor her right of dower therein, shall be vested in the trustee so

appointed, who may sue for, in his own name, and recover, any property or debt so vested in him, and may also prosecute to judgment any suit commenced by the said debtor before his appointment. (To be continued.)

NEW-YORK, November 16.

LATEST FROM PORTUGAL.

Yesterday arrived at this port, the brig Sylph, Forbes, 38 days from Lisbon, which port she left on the 7th of October. Capt. F. informed us, that no battle between the Allied Armies and the French had taken place since the 28th of September, (the official detail of which we published in our last paper)—that Lord Wellington's head quarters were at Villa Franca, and the French army in sight.—That the French occupied Oporto and Figueras, and that Gen. Massena had been reinforced with Marshall Morucier's Division, consisting of about 12,000 men. Lord Wellington had been joined by the Marquis Romana, with an army of about 14,000 men, who were in the highest spirits, and well equipped 3,000 troops arrived at Lisbon from England 2 days before Capt. F. sailed & immediately joined the British army—A great and decisive battle was momentarily expected to take place. The Allied Army were in the highest spirits and confident of victory;—but to provide against a defeat, a part of the British Transports had moved down the Tagus, and an Embargo was laid on all vessels in Lisbon, on the 7th of October, the day Capt. F. sailed; who left the port early in the morning, and was informed of the Embargo after dropping down the Tagus.

Capt. F. further informed us, that great alarm prevailed amongst the inhabitants of Lisbon, and that several American vessels had discontinued discharging their cargoes. In addition to the above we have perused a letter from the captain of an American vessel in Lisbon, to his owners in this city, dated October 6th, from which the following is an extract:—"The minds of people are so agitated by the rapid movements of the two armies, that they are incapable of fixing on any thing. I should have sailed this day; but finding the combined forces under Lord Wellington calling back so rapidly, after a partial engagement of his left wing with a detachment of the French, I am induced to wait a few days longer. The alarm is so great that business is entirely at a stand. Nothing but flour can be sold. Within these two days paper money has fallen 12 per cent. it is now fluctuating between 35 and 41 below par. The head quarters of Lord Wellington's army were at Villa Franca yesterday, and to day at Mafra, 55 or 60 miles from Lisbon, where he intends to receive the French to determine the fate of Portugal. The line of defence is formed from thence to Alverca. Thus the army is situated from the sea to the banks of the Tagus. Alverca is only 16 miles from Lisbon. Beresford is there. Mortier with 16,000 men, according to the last accounts was at Tomar; and Romana, with 20,000 Spaniards, at Abrantes, observing his movements. Some prisoners were brought in here yesterday, among them Gen Simms, badly wounded. Massena has declared that after striking the first blow he would not stop until he has driven the English into the sea, and it is feared he will keep his promise. The French force is estimated at from 75 to 80,000 men; the combined forces are nearly equal; so that something dreadful and decisive must take place in a day or two. Last night all the large boats and lighters were put in requisition and sent up the river, said to be for transporting the sick and heavy baggage. The head quarters of the French army are at Batalha.

Captain Allen, in 45 days from Gottenburgh, informs, that the Prussian ports were again opened, and that 12 months had been given for the examination of American property under detention.
