

command of the hon. lieut. col. French, and the brigade of the Portuguese infantry, under the command of col. Champeimond, directed by col. Mackinnon. Major gen. Leith also moved to his left, to the support of major gen. Picton, and aided in the defeat of the enemy on this post, by the 3d bat. royals, the 1st and 2d bat. 28th regiment.

In these attacks major generals Leith and Picton, cols Mackinnon and Champeimond, of the Portuguese service, who was wounded, lieut. col. Wallace, the hon. lieut. col. Meade, lieut. col. Sutton of the 9th Portuguese regiment, major Smith 45th regiment, who was unfortunately killed, lieut. col. Douglas, and major Birmingham of the 8th Portuguese regiment, distinguished themselves—Major general Picton reports of the good conduct of the 9th and 21st Portuguese regiments, commanded by lieut. colonel Sutton, and by lieut. colonel de Arouje Bacellar, aid of the Portuguese artillery commanded by lieutenant colonel Arent child. I have also to mention in a particular manner the conduct of capt. Dansey, of the 88th regiment. Major gen. Leith reports the good conduct of the royal 1st bat. 9th, and 2d bat. 38th regiment; and I beg to assure your lordship, that I never witnessed a more gallant attack than that made by the 38th, 45th, and 8th Portuguese regiment, on the enemy's division which had reached the ridge of the Sierra.

On the left, the enemy attacked with three divisions of infantry of the 6th corps, that part of the Sierra occupied by the left division, commanded by brig. gen. Crawford, and by the brigade of Portuguese infantry, commanded by brig. gen. Pack. One division of the infantry only made any progress towards the top of the hill, and they were immediately charged with the bayonet by brig. gen. Crawford, with the 48th, 53d, and 96th regiments, and the 3d Portuguese Caçadores, and driven down with immense loss. Brigadier general Ciemann's brigade of Portuguese infantry, which was in reserve, was moved up to support the right of brig. gen. Crawford's division, and a battalion of the 19th Portuguese regiment, under the command of lieut. col. Macbean, made a gallant and successful charge upon a body of another division of the enemy, which was endeavouring to penetrate in that quarter. In this attack brig. gen. Crawford, lieut. col. Beckwith of the 95th, and Barclay of the 42d, and the commanding officers of the regiments engaged, distinguished themselves.

Besides these attacks, the light troops of the two armies were engaged throughout the 27th, and the 4th Portuguese Caçadores, and the 1st and 16th regiments, directed by brigadier general Pack, and commanded by lieut. colonel de Rego Bumpio, lieut. col. Hill, and major Armstrong, showed great steadiness and gallantry. The loss sustained by the enemy in his attack on the 27th has been enormous. I understand that the general of division Merle and gen. Maucun are wounded, and gen. Simon was taken prisoner by the 52d regiment, and 3 colonels, 33 officers and 250 men. The enemy left 2600 killed on the field of battle, and I understand from the prisoners and deserters that the loss in wounded is immense. The enemy did not renew his attack, excepting by the fire of his light troops on the 28th, but he moved a large body of infantry and cavalry from the left of his centre to the rear, from which I saw his cavalry in march on the road which leads from Martogoa over the mountains towards Oporto.

Having thought it probable that he would endeavour to turn our left by that road, I had directed col. Trant, with his division of militia, to march to Sardo, with the intention that he should occupy those mountains, but unfortunately he was sent round by Oporto by the general officer commanding in the North, in consequence of a small detachment of the enemy being in possession of St. Pedro de Sul; and notwithstanding the effort which he made to arrive in time, he did not reach Sardo till the 23th at night, after the enemy was in possession of the ground.

As it was probable that in the course of the night of the 28th the enemy would throw his whole army upon that road, by which he could avoid the Sierra de Busaco, and reach Coimbra by the high road to Oporto, and thus the army would have been exposed to be cut off from that town, or to a general action on less favourable ground; and as I had reinforcements in my rear, I was induced to withdraw from the Sierra de Busaco. The enemy did break up on the mountains at 11 at night of the 28th, and he made the march expected. His advanced guard was at Avelas, in the road from Oporto to Coimbra yesterday; and the whole army was seen in march through the mountains; that under my command, however, was already in the low country, between the Sierra de Busaco and the sea; and the whole of us, with the exception of the rear guard, is this day on the left of the Mondego.

Although from the unfortunate circumstances of the delay of col. Trant's arrival at Sardo, I am apprehensive that I shall not succeed in effecting the object which I had in view in passing the Mondego, and in occupying Sierra de Busaco, I do not regret my having done so.—This movement has afforded me a favourable opportunity of shewing the enemy the description of troops of which this army is composed; it has brought the Portuguese levies into action with the enemy for the first time in an advantageous situation; and they have proved that the trouble which has been taken with them, has not been thrown away.

in the same ranks with British troops, in this interesting cause, which they afford the best hopes of saving.

The enemy has made no movement in Estramadura, or in the northern provinces since I addressed your lordship last. My last accounts from Cadiz are of the 9th. I enclose a return of the killed and wounded of the allied armies in the course of the 23th, 26th, 27th and 28th instant.

Return of the killed, wounded, missing and prisoners of war of the Portuguese army, on the 27th Sept.

Killed—4 captains, 2 subalterns, 1 serjeant, 1 drummer, 82 rank and file.

Wounded—1 colonel, 1 major, 5 captains, 18 subalterns, 9 serjeants, 478 rank and file.

Prisoners and missing—2 serjeants, 18 rank and file.

Total—killed 90, wounded 512, prisoners and missing 20.

The precise loss of the British army is 97 killed and 434 wounded—of the Portuguese, 90 killed and 512 wounded."

" PARIS, Sept. 26, "We inform you that his majesty issued the following decree of the 24th instant:—

"The merchandise proceeding from the American vessels which were sequestrated in Holland, and which have not been already transported to Antwerp, shall be sent there without delay. The Maryland tobacco, however which have not been yet removed thither, may be sold in the ports where they are.

"Such persons as have received any article which made part of the aforesaid cargoes either on estimate or as securities, shall pay the amount thereof before the 15th of next October. Those to whom they have been delivered, without a previous valuation, shall pay the amount at the current price on the Amsterdam exchange. The price shall be settled by an inquiry before the 10th of October, and the payment of the value then fixed must be made before the 1st November. An inspector of the customs shall be sent to Holland to superintend the regulations prescribed by this decree, and to report thereon to our director general."

Port of Baltimore.

From the Merchant's Coffee-House Books. November 17.

Arrived, schr Fly, Gould, from Havana—sugar & coffee—R & J Oliver Cup: G. sailed the 2d instant, three days after the gale, and says such was the confusion on shore and in the harbour, it being what they could from the wreck, that the extent of the damage done could not well be ascertained; and being himself closely engaged in securing & clearing his own vessel, could not bring a general list. The gale was felt throughout the island. An express had arrived at Havana from St. Jago, requesting aid and assistance. The schooners Merchant and Floret, of this port, rode out the gale.

Entered, schr Saucy Jack, Auld, P. s. samsquoddy.

Cleared, schooner Bee, Austin, Jacquemel.

November 18. Arrived, ship Severn, Bryden, from Tonnango. Left there 5th Oct. The embargo was taken off 25th Sept. Ports open in Denmark.—The Adriana and George and Albert of this port, had been admitted to entry, and were discharging. Reports prevailed, that Amer vessels at Copenhagen had been released. Several vessels for the U. S. sailed before the Severn, on the raising of the embargo.

Also, schr Hazard, White, from the Baltic via Leith, (where she was carried in) 28 days from the latter place. Sailed from thence the 23d of October.

The brig Paragon, from Gottenburg, is in the Bay.

Ship Frances Henrietta, Skinner, has arrived at London in 21 days from New York.
