guarding them from damp and wet plan would collect In the wool of the tail

2d. When the weather is fair and clear they should not be turned out until the

dew is perfectly dry.

3d. They should be kept with great care from ever standing in stagment water, that has no current, and soap suds are very pernicious to them
4th They should becarefully guarded

from thunder and hail storms, they should not graze then or drink of that water, waiting till the rain and hail moisture has disappeared, for this is very injurious to said sheep. The sait should be given them in the morning and the evening, keeping them from drinking till three or four hours after; the salt in this country being different from that used in Spain should be sparingly given till they are used to it; there it is of a red colour and from a pit, and here it is white, which is not so beneficial for the feeble sheep

5th This kind of sheep is very subject to have the acab, and it often makes i.s. appearance from night to morning, and requires a constant attention to cure it. The best remedy is juniper oil; a decoction of black tobacco leaf is also good; but when the latter is used it is necessary that the weather should be dry, for if it should rain it would spread mere. The fourth part of a pound of tobacco should be put in a kettle with ten or (welve pluts of water, and after it shall have been boiled, the scab mus be well rubbed with it in a luke warm, and not hot state, otherwise the wool would be injured.

6th For the disorder called basquilla, (disease in sheep arising from the pleni ude of food) heeding in the belly, on the fore part of the dug in a vein which they have there, is good

7th. If any should swell in their belly. they should be bled under the corner of the left eye.

Sth. For the disease of the spleen. they should be pricked with an awl in the spleen, which is found by leaving three ribs behind and four fingers below the back bone. This disorder of the spleen is very injurious; as for instance, if a sheep should die with it that wears a small bell, and this should afterwards be put on another, it will also die .-These three disorders proceed from to great abundance of clear fresh grass; shepherds should be particularly attentive on this point.
9th. The small pox makes its first

appearance by blisters or tumors on the flanks or hinder part of the sides, and then it spreads by degrees all over is necessary to seperate the infected from the sound, so that they may nei her lodge for glaze together; for one st.k sheep is an ugh to intectall the res: -This disease proceeds from drinking standing water, and it is necessary to let it have its course, taking care to exa mine them often, and as soon as the pustules are broken to anoint the same with sweet oil

10th. In the disorder called modernez. (lethargy) they turn round as they are grazing. This arising frem blisters that are forming in the brain, and they turn on that side where these pustules grow. Ve y few recover from this disease, which is contegious for the others. Some get well by pricking with an awl the affected part and drawing that water, but they generally remain imperfect. and it is better therefore to kill those that have that disorder.

11 h. Lameness- If it should be found that the foot is swollen and that it has matter, the points of the nails should be broken off till it bleeds; should it be perceived that its pera (a small tuft of hair between the two noils) is swollen, it should be drawn out with a need'e and cut around with a knife, pulling until ir comes out: by this means it will heal much sooner than if it were burst.

12th The horns of the rams are cut off in Spain for two reasons; the first is to avoid their striking one another with them in the season of generating; and the second is that it may serve them in stead of bleeding in the spring at which eason it is executed, choosing fair and warm weather for this operation. This is the manner in which it is done :- A hole is made in the ground, the ram is put in it with his legs upwards, and a board on his head to which the horn is well fitted : then a knife made for that purpose is fixed against the horn level with the head, and is cut off with two blows struck with a hammer. This opcration is performed every year with on ly those that are preserved for propagation, and are dis inguished with the name of Moruecos (ram, or male sheep)

13th It is customary in Spain to allow two ewes to one lamb, that they may seon get strong and be able to resist the inclemency of the weather, and it should be sindled that they come into the world in a fine season; they ought to have a dry litter, and when they are turned cut to graze, it should be in a sunny place free from any water. The disorders to which the lambs are liable are the following :- The Loban He (ven, ganglion) in which their kidneys swell. The A marilla (jaur d'ec) in which their flesh and bones turn of the colour of yellow wax; this disorder is infectious; throw Ing a small quantity of Torreco (fixleaved dapline, dapline guidium) is good fr this complated. The Comiro (curb) they are lame in their feet; if these should swell, it is good to oint them with juniper or sweet oil All these three disorders proceed from damp and wer weather when they are brought forth; and are besides subject to all the com plaints of the ewes, for which the same remedies aforestated must be observed.

14 h The tails of these sheep are cut off because it is the sustom and because if they should have the disorder called Chamberga (diatrhoca) the dirt they

would be considerable, and would certainly spoil the remainder with it. This operation is performed when they are o months old, with a very sharp knife, cutting away the wool around it with a pair of scissors to prevent its sticking to the wound, choosing for this purpose; warm and fine weather.

It is very necessary and advantageous to observe attentively all the things afore stated, if one wishes to avoid considerable losses in this kind of sheep
