The brig Constellation, arrived at this port yesterday, in 28 days from Lisbon. William Jarvis, Esq. late American consul at Lisbon, has returned to the United States in this vessel.

It appears by this arrival, that an embargo took place on the 8th October, on all shipping which were required to take a fourth of their cargoes, and one fourth of the whole number of passengers, on account of government, receiving a com pensa ion

The English had called in all their ou:posts, which brought the French within about 5 leagues of Lisbon, (i e. to Villa Franca) on the margin of the Tagus, and 7 leagues on the side of the ocean. A line between which was drawn

about 70,000 effective men.

PHILADELPHIA, November 27. FROM PORTO RICO.

Captain Wilson of the sch'r Concordia, arrived here last evening, in 14 days from St. John's (Porto Rico,) informs that a few days previous to his sailing, the following Spanish ships of war, viz. two three deckers, the St. Anna and Prince Sepeo, a frigate and sloop of war, under convoy of the British 74 Implaca-ble, captain Cockburn, hove too off the harbour, and sent in for supplies sailed from Cadiz bound for the Havan na, and from thence to South America. The British 74 had to send 56 of her men on board the three deckers, the Spanisrds not being able to work the ships. The troops that left Porto Rico three months ago, to quell the insurrection at Carac cas, were principally massacred. The people of that country were determined to support its independence.-The day before his departure from St. John's, a vessel arrived from New Barcelona on the Main, with several fa milies, for safety
