Extract from the report of the commissioners appointed to lay out and survey the plot contemplated to be called the "CITY OF ROME"

At a meeting of the counsellers of the City At a meeting of the consisters of the City of Rome, held in the city of Philadelphia, the 30th of October, 1810, the following extract from the report of the commissioners, was ordered to be published in two or more newspapers of the said city.

pers of the said city.

"The commissioners report, that agreeably to the order of the counsellore, they have proceeded to the city of Rome, where they arrived on the 21st day of October, 1810, and on that day fixed upon the soute and marked the most eligible spot for and determined the course which the strees are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lehigh on the turn, like leading to Wilkesbarre, and found the distance from said bridge to the centra of said city of Rome, called Union Square, to be five miles. Said bridge is about 100 m less from the city of Philadelphia, and 17 miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the cast side of the Susquehama. The centre of If miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the east side of the Susquehama. The centre of Union Square aforexaid, is situate on a gentle rise of ground, gradually elevated a few feet above the adjoining squares. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Itome, throughout the whole extent, app ars to be exceilent, abounding with atreams of wholesome water, the principal of which is called "Trout Creek," which affords water sufficient to turn mills of any description. The timber is valuable, consisting of Sugar Maple, Black Cherry, Black Birch, White Ash, Spuce and Beech. The road (which is now engaged to be cut from the turnpike to Union Square,) is surveyed through a pleasant tract of country, and a surveyor is now engaged to by out all the streets.
