A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of Maryland, did, by an act passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, entitled, an act to reduce into one, the several acts of Assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, directed that the Governor and Council, after having received the returns of the elections of the members to represent this state in the congress of the United States, should determine and ascertain the number of votes given for each and every person voted for as a member to congress aforesaid respectively, and shall thereupon declare by proclamation, signed by the governor, the name of the elected persons; persons duly in each respective district. We, in pursuance of the direction of the said act, do by this our Proclamation declare, that by the return made to us, it appears, that Philip Stuart, Esquire, was elected for the first district—Joseph Keit, Esquire, was elected for the second district—Philip B. Keit, Esquire, was elected for the third district—Samuel King, Esquire, was elected for the fourth district—Alex. de la Roche and Peter Little, Esq., were elected for the fifth district—John Montgomery Esquire was elected for the sixth district—John H. H. of Nat. an Esquire, was elected for the seventh district; and Charles G. G. Esq. was elected for the eighth district. Given in council, the city of Annapolis, under the great seal of the State of Maryland, this fifth day of October, 1806. Our Lord one hundred and eighteenth day, and of the independence of the United States of America, the thirty-third.
