CONGRESS, MESSAGE, &c.
The House of Representatives formed
a quorum on Monday; but only 15
members appeared in the Senate. It is
therefore probable, that the message of
the president will not have been sent to
Congress before this day. Should it be
received here this afternoon, we will
publish it in an extra sheet, to cure
public impatience—an impatience which
imagines (notwithstanding former dis-
appointments) that this session will ter-
minate our submission; that this session
will see an end of an unequal commerce,
rendered still more unprofitable by the
United States Bank, which assisted to
sacrifice American rights, interests, and
constitution to the Moloch of Britain.—
But, whatever may be the state of the
public mind, we confess we are neither
uplifted by unreasonable hopes, nor de-
jected by a causeless despondency.

The legislature of Virginia was to
have met on Monday last, that of Penn-
sylvania, yesterday. It can hardly be
doubted that these influential bodies will
co-operate with the General Assembly
of Maryland in protesting against the
renewal of the United States Bank charter.—
The states must retain what is
"reserved" to them; and every thing
(of interior policy) is reserved, except
what is expressly delegated to Congress.

"Appointment by the President.
"Joseph Forrest, a justice of the peace
for Washington county, District of Co-
lumbia!—This gentleman has the re-
commendation of being a *violent federalist*,
unfriendly to Jefferson and
republicanism—and is nearly as eminent
in point of character as his august brother
Dick, whose nomination as consul
to Tunis was unanimously rejected by
the senate! This is one unfortunate in-
stance of—Influence"

that city, either on Monday or yester-

*Notice to the People of the United States
of America.*
John Galland, Engraver, who was ca-
pitally convicted by a Jury of the Citi-
zens of Philadelphia in the year 1798,
for forging Notes, on the Bank of Pann-
sylvania, and whose punishment was re-
mitted after a solitary imprisonment of
two years, on condition of removing him-
self for ever from the States. About the
beginning of last month this fellow em-
barked at Dublin in an American vessel
for New-York, to renew his depredations
on the paper currency of America. He
is about forty six years of age, about five
feet seven inches high, ill looking, and
slovenly in his dress.

COMMUNICATION.
Every improvement in the arts, whether
liberal or mechanical, must give sincere
pleasure to the generous mind; and

or our convenience. A recent one of
this kind, now in the city of Philadel-
phia, must be peculiarly pleasing to
those who are fond of the diversion of
sleigh riding, as well as to the traveller,
whom business calls from home during

relieves them from the inconvenience to
which they have been, hitherto, sub-
jected upon a sudden thaw of the snow;
and will extricate them from the tedious
and mortifying labour of dragging through
the mud, as well as from the discordant
musick produced by the attrition of the
sleigh shoes and gravel stones.—It is a
sleigh with wheels, to which the runners
are so attached, that they act when there
is snow, and detached in case of a thaw,
permitting the rotation of the wheels,
as a very acceptable substitute.
It is said to be the invention of a gen-
tleman in New Jersey who has secured
the same by a patent. (Philada paper.)

LONDON, October 2.
Mr. Margatot, who was transported

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.
(RETRACTS.)
FRIDAY, November 30.
The house resumed the consideration
of the bill for the valuation of the real
and personal property within this state.
After some discussion, on motion of Mr.
M'Pherson, the question was put and
carried, that it be referred to the next
General Assembly.
The clerk of the Senate delivered the
bill to confirm an act passed at Nov-
session 1809, entitled "An act to alter
such parts of the constitution and form
of government of this state as relate to
voters and qualification of voters;" the
bill "To lay out and open a certain road
in Cecil county" passed the 3d day of
Jan. 1807; the supplement to an act,
entitled "An act to lay out and make
public a road therein mentioned in Ce-
cil county," passed the 6th day of Jan.
1809; and the further supplement to the
act entitled "An act for the amending
and reducing into system, the laws and
regulations concerning last wills and tes-
taments, the duties of executors, admin-
istrators and guardians, and the rights
of orphans and other representatives of
deceased persons" severally endorsed
"will pass;"—ordered to be engrossed.
The bill respecting the registering of
marriages, births and deaths, endorsed
"will not pass;" and the resolution of
Mountjoy Bailey, endorsed "assented to."
The house according to the order of
the day, proceeded to the second reading
of the bill to incorporate the stockhol-
ders of the Franklin Bank of Baltimore;
and after considerable debate, the house
adjourned.

Disasters.
A pilot reports that a vessel, supposed
to be the Susan and Sarah from Liver-
pool, struck on the bar on Saturday eve-
ning last, and run on shore in Island
Creek, as is supposed, on account of her
having sprung leak.

We learn with regret, that the dis-
masted English ship, mentioned in our
last, at anchor off the beach of Bald-
Head, has been totally lost. She got
under weigh with a S E wind, and im-
mediately crossing the bar it fell calm,
and she was compelled to anchor; be-
fore it was possible for her to better her
situation, the wind shifted round to the
S W and blew with such violence that
she drove on shore from her anchors and
shortly after bilged. She proved to be
the Olympus, from Plymouth bound to
this port, and consigned to William
Giles, Esq. of this town.
