CITY OF ROME.

Extract from the report of the commissioners appointed to lay out and survey the plot contemplated to be called the 4 CITY OF ROME.

At a meeting of the counsellers of the City of Rome, held in the city of Philadelphia, the 30th of October, 1810, the following extract from the report of the commissioners, was ordered to be published in two or more newspapers of the said city.

dered to be published in two or more newspapers of the said city.

"The commissioners report, that agreeably to the order of the cousellors, they have proceeded to the city of Ronse, where they arrived on the 21st day of Uciober, 1810, and on that day fixed upon the scire and marked the most eligible spor for and determined the course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lehigh on the turn; like leading to Wilkesbarre, and foun 1 the distance from said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union Square, to be five miles. Said bridge is about 100 m less from the city of Philadelphia, and 17 miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the east side of the Susquehanna. The centre of Union Square aforenaid, is situate on a gentle rise of ground, radually elevated a few icet above the adjoining squares. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Rome, throughout the whole extent, app ars to be x-callent, abounding with streams of wholesome water, the principal of which is called "Trout Creek," which affords water sufficient to turn mills of any description. The timber is valuable, consisting of 'ugar Maple, Black Cherry, Black Birch, White Ash, Spruce and Beech. The road (which is now engaged to be cut from the turnpike to Union Square,) is surveyed through a pleasant trict of country, and a surveyor is now engaged to lay our all the streets.
