Resolved, That the governor and and council be, and they are hereby authorised to appoint three commissioners on the part of this state, to meet such commissioners as may be appointed for the same purpose by the commonwealth of Virginia, to settle and adjust, by mutual compact between the two governments, the western limits of this state, and the dividing line and boundary between this state and said commonwealth; and also to settle and adjust as aforesaid, any claim of this state, and the said commonwealth, to territory within the limits of the other; and the commissioners appointed as aforesaid are required to report their proceedings in virtue of their appointment and authority, to the general assembly of this state, at their next session, after the same shall we been concluded, for confirmation 1 ction.

Resolved, That the governor on state be requested to transmit without delay to the governor of Virginia, a copy of the foregoing resolve, in order rolls being laid before the legislature of that commonwealth; and at the same time to communicate the wish of this General Assembly that a similar resolve may be passed by the Legislature of Virginia.

BOSTON, Dec. 4.
LATEST FROM ENGLAND. Capt. Lewis, who arrived here yes-terday from Liverpool, favoured the Exchange Coffee-house with a London evening paper of the 25th of October, from which the following paragraphs are extracted.

LONDON, OCT. 25. Dispatches were last night received announcing that the Isle of Bonaparte (late of Burbon) surrendered to the British arms on the 28th of July. English had none killed in the attack, and only 18 wounded. A valuable French brig was taken off the Isle of France.

The mysterious allusions in the last Paris papers to the arrivel of "a foreign Prince at Fontainbleau," and the happiness the empress was about to receive in a few days," are explained by letters to the 20th inst. received yesterday from the French coast. Accordto these, this foreign prince is no less a personage than the emperor FRANCIS, whose visit is supposed to be for other purposes beside the mere indulgence of a father's fondness.

The Dolphin and Zenobia sailed this day from Portsmouth, for Spain and Portugal, with a Convoy in which thirty thousand blankets, and twenty thousand pair of shoes are sent to the patriots in Spain.

Dur advices from high authority informs us, that all American vessels that have entered French ports in ballast, and which have been boarded by British cruizers were at liberty to load with French produce, and return to the U. States.

A vessel, under the flag of the Republic, with sugar, coffee, and other commodities, had been permitted in a French harbor to disharge her cargo, upon paying the stipulated duties.

The Board of Trade yesterday desist

ed from granting licences to and from French ports, and also to and from French ports within the range designated in the orders in council."
