Legislature of Maryland.

(EXTRACTS.)

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Monday, December 3.

Mr. Bowles delivered a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, stating that a large subscription has been made for the purpose of erecting an academy in Hagerstown, and praying for an act of incorporation; which was read and referred.

Mr. Jump delivered a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change a road in the village of Denton, in Caroline county; which was twice read, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivered the bill to preserve the breed of fish in Baltimore county, endorsed, "will pass."—Ordered to be engrossed. The bill annulling the marriage of Ezekiel Walker, endorsed "will not pass." And the resolution in favour of Jacob Eversole, endorsed, "assented to."

Mr. Wilson delivered a petition from Samuel T. Parker, of Worcester county, praying that a deed from George Smith to him may be confirmed: Mr. Wright delivered a petition from sundry inhabitants of Talbot county, praying that a company may be incorporated to make a toll drawbridge over Chop-tank river; and Mr. Marriott delivered a petition from Thomas Cockey, of Baltimore county, praying that he may be authorised to erect gates on the road from Ellicott's upper mills to the red house; which were read and referred.

Mr. Bland delivered a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the filling up and extending of certain lots on the south side of the basin in the city of Baltimore; Mr. McPherson delivered a bill, entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Charles county to sell and dispose of the land therein mentioned; and Mr. Bland delivered a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Maxwell, of the city of Baltimore, and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Abraham Fuller, of the city of Baltimore; which were read.

On motion of Mr. Wilson, leave given to bring in a bill, to provide for the speedy trial of criminals, and to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned.

Tuesday, December 4.

Mr. Bowie delivered a bill to alter and amend all such parts of the constitution of this state as prevent the election of the judges of the levy courts in the several counties of this state by the people.

Wednesday, December 5.

Mr. Groome delivered a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cecil county, praying that the number of useless dogs may be reduced; referred to Messrs. Groome, Downey and Physick.

Mr. Bland delivered a bill to incorporate the President and Directors of the Athenæum Society.

CONGRESS.

IN SENATE.

Thursday, December 6.

At the usual hour of meeting a number of members assembled; but a quorum not appearing, about one o'clock the senate adjourned. [It may be proper to remark that one of the senators (gen. German) who came here sick, was temporarily confined by indisposition.]

Friday, December 7.

Mr. Anderson attended.
The petition of Larkin Smith, collector of the port of Norfolk, praying for an increase of compensation, has been referred to Messrs. Giles, Leib, and Crawford.

The bill to suspend the second section of the act entitled "An act regulating foreign coins and for other purposes," was read a second time, and committed to Messrs. Smith of Md. Crawford and Dana.

On motion by Mr. Giles.
Resolved, That so much of the message of the president of the U. States as concerns the relations between the United States and France and Great Britain, with the accompanying documents, be referred to a select committee to examine and report thereon to the senate, and that the committee have leave to report by bill or otherwise.

Messrs. Giles, Crawford, Anderson, Goodrich and Pope were appointed a committee accordingly.
Mr. Giles also offered the following resolution, the consideration of which was on motion postponed to Monday next:

Resolved, That so much of the message of the president of the U. States as relates to the occupation of that part of West Florida which is included within the boundaries described by the treaty for the acquisition of Louisiana, with the accompanying documents, be referred to a select committee with instructions to examine the same, and report thereon to the senate; and that the committee have leave to report by bill, bills or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Smith of Md. Resolved, That so much of the president's message as relates to the Corps of Engineers and the Military Academy be referred to a select committee to report by bill, bills or otherwise.
Messrs. Smith of Md. Gilman, Bradley, Pickering and Reed were appointed the committee.

The petition presented on Tuesday by Mr. Giles) of the stockholders of the Farmer's Bank of Alexandria, praying for a charter, was, on motion, referred to Messrs. Giles, Leib, Goodrich, Crawford and Cutts.
Adjourned to Monday.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Thursday, December 6.

Immediately on meeting, the house resumed the reading of the documents accompanying the message of the president of the United States, which being concluded:

On motion of Mr. Newton, 3000 copies of the message and documents accompanying the same were ordered to be printed.

On motion of Mr. Macon, these papers were referred to a committee of the whole on the state of the Union.

On motion of Mr. Alston, it was ordered that the several standing committees be now appointed. The following gentlemen were accordingly appointed by the speaker on the respective committees.

Committee of Public Lands.

Messrs. Morrow, Goodwyn, Ely, Boyd, Gold, Cobb and De Keel.

Committee of Revised and unfinished Business.

Messrs. Southard, Jackson and Witherspoon.

Committee of District of Columbia.

Messrs. Van Horn, L. J. Alston, Weakley, G. Smith, J. C. Chamberlin, Tracy and Breckenridge.

Committee of Accounts.

Messrs. N. R. Moore, Turner and Kennan.

Committee of Post-Offices and Post-Roads.

Messrs. Rhea, Ten. Thompson, Desha, Stanford, Troup, Calhoun, Morrow, Davenport, Chittenden, Key, Whitehill, J. Smith, Potter, Wilson, Seaver and Hufty.

Mr. Southard laid before the house the resolution of the legislature of New Jersey disapproving the amendments to the constitution proposed by the state of Massachusetts for limiting the power to lay embargoes; by the state of Pennsylvania, for erecting an impartial tribunal to decide disputes between states; and by the state of Virginia for the removal of senators of the United States on the request of a majority of the legislature of each state respectively.

Friday, December 7.

On motion of Mr. Root, the house resolved itself into a committee of the whole on the state of the Union, Mr. Macon in the chair.

Mr. Root then moved the appointment of several committees on the president's message; but it being suggested that the documents had not been laid on the table of the members,

The committee rose, without deciding on any thing in relation to the message.

Mr. Lewis presented the petition of the stockholders of the Farmer's Bank of Alexandria, praying for a charter; which was referred to a committee on the District of Columbia.

Useful Inventions.

On motion of Mr. Bacon,
Resolved, That the secretary of state be directed to lay before this house a list of the names of persons who have invented any new or useful arts, machine, manufacture or composition of matter or any improvement thereon, and to whom patents have been issued for the same from that office subsequent to the 23d day of January, 1805, with the dates and general objects of such patents.

Apportionment of Representation.

Mr. Fisk laid upon the table the following resolution:

Resolved, That the apportionment of representatives among the several states according to the third enumeration of the people, ought to be in the ratio of one representative for every thousand persons in each state, and that a committee be appointed, to report thereon, by bill or otherwise.

On the suggestion of Mr. Alston that the apportionment ought to be fixed before the census of each state was known, and thus avoid a difficulty which would arise in fixing on a ratio—

The house now took up the resolution, which was agreed to, and a committee of 7 appointed accordingly.

After the presentation and reference of some other petitions, amongst which were petitions from sundry sugar refiners—

The house adjourned to Monday.
