Should this suggestion be adopted by the logislature, it will naturally occur how far it would be jroper, under certain monthemons, to extend it to members of uniformed volunteer com penies, artifery, cavalry and infantry. In conjunction with a provision of this kind it is believed that the interests of the militia would be much prompled by prohibiting resignatives, except in cases of disability, or of her subjected tributal, to be determined by an appointed tributal. It is hoped that a primpt a ten ion, on the part of the brigade inspectors, to the orders of the adjushing neral, will enable the exscutive shortly to communicate informatich on this subject, so necessary and desirable. The establishment of convenient places of deposit for the arms, which are the property of the commonwealth, the appointment of regimental samovers, with an adequate salary, in whose care the arms ought to be, and who should give security for their being kept in complete repair, and good order, and delivery when occasion might re-quire.—And the organization of a gane neral department, and some provision to meet expences to which the funds of some regiments are not adequate, would probably be found beneficial and economical.

In conformity with the direction of a former legislature the judges of the supreme court reported to the last legislature a lis. of the setute laws of England, that sie in force in Pennsylvania; they have also stated their opinion as to what part of those statutes ought to be incorporated into our law. - Mry I not sug gest to you the propriety of directing that those statu'es be printed, so that having them before you, such selections and alterations might be made, and enacted into laws, as may be deemed salutary and congenial ith the habits and manners of the peop c, and our republicen institutions. This would be (as it would seem) a completion of the object originally intended to be obtained by the legislature.

The code of our laws has now become voluminous, the numerous afterations in many of our laws and supplements to others, have sende ed it a matter of extreme labor and difficulty to ascertain Precisely what the law is, on any particular subject, even to the professional men, much mere so to the mass of the people, who are affected by them. In a government, like ours, it is highly desnable that every man should understand the laws by which he is to be governed; might it not, therefore, be worthy the attention of t e icgis atme, to remedy the evil and accomplish an object so desirable, by a revision of all our statute laws, and by coliceting and bringing in o view in one act, all laws on the same subject.

It is, perhaps, not within the compass of the human mind lows, as to supply a re- edy for every invasion of right, that must arise from the complicated transactions of an active and enterprising people, yet every effort ought to be made to leave as little as possible to the arbitrary will of any one; might it not the store be expedient, from time to true, to reduce to statute so much, and such parts, of the common law as experience may have shown to be silutary and congenial with our republican government. In one of our sister states, I am informed, a person is to-pointed to take down, and report to the legislature, cases tried and adjudged in the supreme court; thus from time to time, materials are furnished which enable the legislature to reduce to statute form, such paris of the common law as is thought salutary, and to reject what is deemed mapplicable to our state of rociety and the gentus of our laws Uniformity of decision is also desirable in justsprudence. Our statute laws, eather from ambiguity, or from other causes have been differently construed by different judges; hence what is considered the law, in one circuit, is not so considered in another, this evil might be icmedied, by either amending the law, where it is of coubital construction, er by sonctioning that construction which appears to be the most just ind equita-

It is matter for mutual congratulation that in the judicia y department of the government there is less complaint than

political science which the new world there has been for many previous years. meet the approbation of a very large majority of the people. Its magnitude and novelty put it, in a peculiar manner, under the care of the legislature. The Liw of the last session establishing compulsory arbitration has been extensively acted upon and has proved as extensively salutary. (l'ermit me in proof of this position to state, that out of 130 reports made under that law, and delivered into the office of the prothonotary of Lancaster county, there have not been more than 10 appeals) The legislature bringing with them the experience of every part of the commonwealth, and public opinion, must be aware of the de fects in the law and will cheerfully and speedily apply the remedies. There is me suggestion applicable to all our laws on arbitration which deserves consideration, as it is by many thought nocoisary to perpetuate the system and establish justice, by enacting, that the award of arbitrators, shall, on appeal. he cqual in effect, and as much a fien upon the real estate of the par y against whom it stall be given as the verifict of a jury in similar cire imstances.

The crimical code of Pennsylvania, justly celebrated for its infidness and efficiency, yet authorizes the punishment of death. The happy effects which are acknowledged to have resulted from the abolition of public and shameful punishmen's would wirrant an experiment to a certain how far the abolition of the punishment of death would be attended with like benefitial consequences to so-ciety. The liabits, manners, and religi-ous opinious of a very respectable succession. be of our clazers, make them receive from being to any way instrumental, in bringing to the Lor of justice -testifying against -or consisting-a fellow, being, when they know that the consequence of that conviction is to be, the death of the offender. These considerations multiply very much the chances of escaping after the perpetration of the mos. co d blooded, malicious, and unproviked intuitier, and act therefore, rather as incentives to provoke, than as curbs to restrain, the most ferocious passions of the human heart -- Whe her the substitution of imprisonment during life, or any other punishment, would be productive of less evil to society than the punishment of death, is a question meriting the attention of humane and enlightened legislators. Though on the one hand betin opinion and fee ing pro np: a hope for an amelioration of our penal code, so far as repects the punishment of death, (f.r. of all du ies which it becames the executive to porto in, I can, from experibeing, the day -the hour on which he shall ceise to exist, is the most plinful and discussing.) tot, on the other hand, I conceive it my duty to suggest the necessiy or revising the laws for the suppression of vice and immorality, and strengthening the arm of the magistra-The seat of the government has, of late years, repeatedly exhibited, at publie nices, scenes of dissipation, idleness, disorder, and almost every species of vice; highly dishonourable and radically destructive to the morals of the citizens Your wisdom will provide an appropriare remedy.

Moral virtue consists in a knowledge of duty and a conformity of will and an tion to that knowledge. Political virue, tion to the knowledge. in a republic, founded on moral rectitude, consists in a love of the republic and esteem for its institutions-hence the immense importance of a system of odu cation. Can a man be morally, or politically, virtuous, who is ignorant of the value of the first, and understands not the principle of, nor knows the duties which the latter enjoin? To establish therefore a system of education, calculated to diffuse general instruction, is at once of primary importance in both a moral and palitical point of view, affording the strongest bulwarks against the subversion of good morals and sound po-The impor hical principles. education is still more enhanced by the consideration, that in a republican, or representative government, every citi zen may be called upon to assist in the enaction, or execution of the laws of his country, and will hence, necessarily engage your attention.

The department of accounts will exhibit to you detailed statements of our finances, from which you will perceive that they are more han adequate to the experices of the current year. The act for encouraging the patenting lands has brought mo the treasury \$264,7 5 9 since the 11th day of May last. A large sum is yet to be derived from that source, but as that must and thy dianinish, it might be prude to test in prodective funds the surplus that remains, after the appropriations to need the expences of the current year, and for ne cessary improvements. Ity prudence and economy, not inconsistent with a itberal police, a permanent annual revenue may be raised, adequate to all the ordinary expences of the government, & every needful internal imi ovement withou imposing any taxes on the people for those purposes.
