"The commissioners report, that agreeably to the order of the counsellors, thy have proceeded to the city of Rome, where they arrived on the 21st day of October, 18:0, and on that day fixed upon the scate and marked the most eligible spot for and determined the course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lehigh on the turnpike leading to Wilkesbarre, and found the distance from said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union Square, to be five miles. Said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union Square and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the cast side of the Susquehanna. The centre of Union Square aforesaid, is situate on a gentle rise f ground, gradually elevated a few feet above the adjoining squares. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Rome, throughout the whole eatent, app ars to be excellent, abounding with streams of a holesome water, the principal of which is called "Trout Greek," which alfords water sufficient to turn mills of any description.
