DISTRESSED SCAMEN. The following message, addressed to both Houses, was received from the President of the United States by Mr. Edward Coles, his secretary: To the Senate and House of

Representatives of the U. States.
Lay before Congress, and recommend to their early attention, a report of the Secretary of State, from which it will be seen that a very considerable demand, beyond the legal appropriation, has been incurred for the support of seamen distressed by seizures, in different ports of Europe, of vessels to which they belonged.

REPORT. Department of State, December 11, 1810.

Sin-The funds which had been pro vided by law for the relief and protection of destitute American seamen in foreign countries, have been this year rendered inadequate to their contemplated object by the extentive scizures of our vessels in Europe, and the effect thereof on the situation of the crews.— The advances, which have been necessarily made by our minister and con suls abroad to supply the wants of those seamen, and to procure them passages to the United States, have greatly exceeded the amount of these appropriated funds. Of those advances accounts. requiring immediate reimbursement, have already been rendered to the amount of --- dollars, and it is appre hended that others may yet be received.

As these accounts cannot be paid under any existing law, it is respectfully proposed to submit to the consideration of congress the propriety of passing a law, which will appropriate a sum of money for the repayment of the advances of which accounts have been already exhibited, and which at the same time shall provide for any similar expenees that may have occurred or may oceur during the present or the ensuing year. With this view I have the honor of laying before you the enclosed estimate.
