## CITY OF ROME.

Extract from the report of the commissioners appointed to lay out and survey the plot contemplated to be called the "CITY OF ROME."

At a meeting of the counsellers of the City of Rome, held in the city of Philadelphia, the 30th of October, 1810, the following extract from the report of the commissioners, was ordered to be published in two or more newspa-pers of the said city.

"The commissioners report, that agreeably

to the order of the counsellors, they have pro-ceeded to the city of Rome, where they arriv-ed on the 21st day of October, 1810, and on ea on the 21st day of October, 1210, and on that day fixed upon the seite and marked the most cligible spot for and determined on the course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lebigh on the turnpike leading to Wilkesbarre, and found the distance from said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union square, to be five miles. Said bridge is about 100 miles from the city of Philadelphia, and 17 miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the cast side of the Susquehama. The centre of Union Square aforesaid, is situate on a gentle rise of ground, gradually elevated a few fiet above the adjoining squares. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Rome, throughout the whole extent, appears to be excellent, abounding with streams of wholesome water, the principal of which is called "Trout Creek,", which affords water sufficient to turn milts of every detription. The timber is valuable, consisting of Sugar Maple, Black Cherry, Black Birch, White Ash, Spruce and Beech, The road (which is now engaged to be cut from the turipike to Union Spicee,) is surveyed through a parasent tract of country, and a surveyor is now engaged to by out all the streets.
