**CITY OF ROME.**  
Extract from the report of the commissioners appointed to lay out and survey the plot contemplated to be called the "CITY OF ROME."  
At a meeting of the councillors of the City of Rome, held in the city of Philadelphia, the 30th of October, 1810, the following extract from the report of the commissioners, was ordered to be published in two or more newspapers of the said city.  
"The commissioners report, that agreeably to the order of the councillors, they have proceeded to the city of Rome, where they arrived on the 21st day of October, 1810, and on that day fixed upon the site and marked the most eligible spot for and determined on the course which the streets are to run. They have measured the distance from the bridge across the Lehigh on the turnpike leading to Wilkesbarre, and found the distance from said bridge to the centre of said city of Rome, called Union square, to be five miles. Said bridge is about 100 miles from the city of Philadelphia, and 17 miles and an half from Wilkesbarre, on the east side of the Susquehanna. The centre of Union Square aforesaid, is situated on a gentle rise of ground, gradually elevated a few feet above the adjoining squares. The quality of the land contained in the plan of the city of Rome, throughout the whole extent, appears to be excellent, abounding with streams of wholesome water, the principal of which is called "Trout Creek," which affords water sufficient to turn mills of every description. The timber is valuable, consisting of Sugar Maple, Black Cherry, Black Birch, White Ash, Spruce and Beech. The road (which is now engaged to be cut from the turnpike to Union Square) is surveyed through a pleasant tract of country, and a surveyor is now engaged to lay out all the streets.

**Directions for taking said Oil.**  
For gout, rheumatism, spleen and sciatic pains, take from 15 to 25 drops as the case may be, on a little sugar, twice or three times a day, and anoint the part affected.  
For debilitated constitutions and consumptions, pains in the breast, colds, coughs, internal bruises or sprains, take from 15 to 20 drops morning, noon and night.  
For external bruises, flesh wounds, scalds and burns, apply the Oil lightly with a feather, and bind it up with thin, soft linnen cloth.  
For ulcers, take 20 drops three times a day for 2 weeks previous to the external application, then applying the Oil two or three times a day, as prescribed for burns.  
For the cramp in the stomach, bilious cholera and pleurisy, take 5 drops every half hour until the complaint ceases. Some of the Oil on a warm flannel, should be applied to the side.  
In cramp and mumps, take five drops every hour in molasses and vinegar, a tea spoonful of each, and anoint the throat and glands with the Oil, apply flannel, as in pleurisy.  
For whooping-cough give to a child of one year old 3 drops every hour. Anoint the sides of the feet, the wrists, palms of the hands, and from the nape of the neck to the lower part of the back-bone, twice a day with the Oil. This continued, far not of a speedy cure.—Increase the dose in proportion to the age of the child.  
For vomiting and lax, or what is commonly known by the name of summer complaint, in children, to a child of one year old give five drops every two hours in a tea spoonful of molasses, increasing the dose corresponding with the age.  
In the measles, the dose may be the same as for the summer complaint, in order to throw the complaint to the surface.  
In dysentery or bloody-dia, (if a grown person) take 20 drops or more, as the constitution will bear, four times a day, in a tea-cup of Rhenish tea or malt-a-beer.  
For the piles of either kind, take ten drops every three hours in a tea-cup of malt-a-beer or Rhenish tea, and anoint the parts after every evacuation with the Oil.  
In pleurisy or asthmatic complaints, take 5 drops five or six times a day in a table spoonful of the syrup of Marsh-mallows, maida chair, or garlic, but particularly the first thing in the morning and last at night.  
For the tetter-worm, take 20 drops morning and evening, and anoint the part with the same 4 or 6 times a day.  
For the tooth-ache, a few drops on a bit of lint or cotton, applied to the affected tooth, will give almost instant relief.  
For a rheumatic pain in the jaw, let it well rubbed with the Oil 2 or 4 times a day.
