

for congress, and to coerce them into a renewal of the charter.

This was certainly a bold stroke, to refuse a compliance with the injunctions of the law, and negotiate a loan before a proposition had been made to and refused by the holders of the exchanged stock.—We need talk no more of the bold strokes of federalism, "a few more bold strokes" like this, would render us as ridiculous in the eyes of the world; as the treasury dispensations, of another branch of the treasury "bold strokes."

We might here proceed to exhibit the various bearings of Mr. Gallatin's measures and intrigues, in order to subvert the bank to the injury of the public, but we shall close this number with a few explanations and references to the principles laid down in Mr. Gallatin's own reports.

The exchanged stock was created by an act of the 11th Feb. 1807, and consisted simply in the change of the name of the same debt, and the time of its discharge, adding the interest of the debt under its old name to the amount of the principal, making it redeemable at pleasure, and giving this redeemable paper in exchange for the evidence of the same debt under the old name; this change of denomination and period of payment is characterized by the exchange of the one paper for the other, not a dollar passed in the transaction; so that had Mr. Gallatin applied as he was by law required to do, to the holders of this exchanged stock, he need not have opened any loan with the bank.

That this is the fact we shall show here by his own evidence. In a letter from the secretary of the treasury, of date the 26th Feb. in the present year, in reply to a letter addressed to him forty nine days before, by Mr. Epes, the chairman of the committee of ways and means, he thus furnishes the commentary on his own conduct in the matter of his loan, proves that it was not only unnecessary, but that taken with the direction of congress it was grossly improper.

Loans 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund will out of the annual appropriation of eight millions of dollars for the payment of the debt, reimburse in 1810 the residue of the exchanged 6 per cent stock, amounting to \$3,750,000 dollars, and in 1811 the whole of the converted 6 per cent stock amounting to 1,860,000 dollars. It is probable that the owners of those two species of stock would consent to relan the amount, provided it was made redeemable a few years.

In the report of the secretary of the treasury of the 30th of June, 1809, on the concerns of the sinking fund we find (page 6) the following:

In proposing to the bank that they should give notice to the treasury of their wish to be reimbursed, the whole amount of their exchanged 6 per cent stock, my object was to facilitate the loan since by that operation there would have been no real payment but only a commutation of debt.

Of a letter from which this extract is made, and the contents of it generally, we shall have more to say when we resume the general topic of the finances and the affairs of the land office particularly, in which a curious series of bold strokes will be exhibited.

We need only observe that the secretary himself here recognizes the willingness of the holders of the exchange stock to relan it; in another report which we cannot conveniently lay our hands on he dwells with particular complacency on the idea of the convenience and utility and economy of relans, because it was not encumbered with any other expense or inconvenience than the signature of a written paper.

We have in discussing the first principle of our objection, led to the first, and in exhibiting the process, established the two other objections which we have urged.

CONGRESSIONAL.

IN SENATE.

THURSDAY, DEC. 20, 1810.

Received from the House of Representatives a bill fixing the compensation of the additional Assistant Postmaster General which was passed to a second reading.

Mr. Giles from the committee to whom was referred the petition of Larkin Smith, Collector of the district of Norfolk and Portsmouth, Virginia, reported a bill for the relief for the Collectors of the ports of Norfolk, Baltimore & Philadelphia—which was passed to a second reading.

The senate, after considering the bill respecting the addition to the territory of New-Orleans, in a committee of the whole, postponed the further consideration until to-morrow.

Mr. Giles obtained leave of absence for a fortnight from this day.

On motion of Mr. Dana,

Resolved, That the President of the United States be requested to cause to be laid before the House, a statement of the proceedings which have been had in execution of the act of 10th February, 1807, intitled "An act to provide for surveying the coasts of the United States."

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Treasury, be directed to lay before this House information of such measures as have been pursued for making a survey of the coast of the territory of Orleans, in virtue of the authority committed to him by the 13th section of an act, approved the 21st day of April, 1806.

FRIDAY, DEC. 21.

Mr. Smith (of Maryland) presented the petition of the Union Bank of Georgetown, praying a charter of incorporation for reasons therein stated; which was referred to Messrs. Smith, (Maryland) Anderson and Pickering.

The bill affixing the compensation of the additional assistant postmaster-general, was read a second time, and referred to Messrs. Bradley, Leib and Smith (of Maryland.)

Mr. Lloyd moved that the bill "declaring the laws now in force in the territory of Orleans, to extend to, and have full force and effect to the river Perdido, pursuant to the treaty concluded at Paris, on the 30th of April, 1803, and for other purposes" should be referred to a committee, with instructions to report their opinion on the title of the United States to the territory in question, and grounds on which that opinion may be founded.

The Yeas and Nays on this motion, being taken, are as follow:

Yeas—Messrs. Dana, Goodrich, Horsey, Lloyd and Pickering.—5.

Nays—Messrs. Anderson, Bradley, Campbell, Clay, Condit, Crawford, Cutts, Franklin, Gaillard, Gilman, Lambert, Leib, Mathewson, Pope, Smith, (Maryland) Smith, (New-York) and Tait.—17.

The further consideration of the above bill was postponed till Wednesday.

Mr. Horsey moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the president of the United States be requested to cause to be laid before the senate all the documents, papers or other evidence in his possession relating to the title of the United States to the territory South of the Mississippi Territory, and eastward of the Mississippi to the river Perdido and to the boundaries of the said territory.

The Yeas and Nays on this question stood thus:

Yeas—Messrs. Dana, Goodrich, Horsey, Lambert, Lloyd, Mathewson and Pickering.—7.

Nays—Messrs. Anderson, Campbell, Clay, Condit, Crawford, Cutts, Franklin, Gaillard, Leib, Pope, Smith, (Maryland) Smith, (New-York) and Tait.—13.

The senate adjourned to Monday.

Latest Foreign News.

LONDON, OCT. 31.

A melancholy accident happened, on Wednesday se'night, on board the brig Dart, of New-Orleans, lying at the dock, (Belfast). The captain, previous to sailing, having given orders to stow the vessel with charcoal, for the purpose of destroying the rats, directed that none of the men should attempt to sleep in the fore-castle that night, as suffocation would certainly be the consequence.—John Grenada, a seaman, disregarding, however, the advice given, went down to his berth unperceived, when the mate was mustering his hands, search was made for Grenada, when he was found lifeless in his hammock.

It is stated in letters from Holland, that no less than sixteen French Couriers were imprisoned at Bayonne for having refused to proceed to the armies in Spain and Portugal with dispatches. Hardly one messenger out of six, who takes the route of the Western Pyrenees, is known to arrive at his destination.

The duties agreeably to the French decree of August 5, will be levied on all colonial produce, found in any ports of the North; those of Russia, for the present, only excepted.

PARIS, OCT. 12.

M. Dubois, chief surgeon at the hospital of the school of medicine, has been appointed surgeon-accoucheur to her majesty the empress.

The following extract of a letter, dated Malta, Aug. 20, was posted at Lloyd's:—

"The supercargo of the Giacus communicates in a letter, dated the 12th, that he is detained at Lissa by contrary winds, but that he is at liberty, and that all the Turkish vessels that were sequestered in the Adriatic had been liberated."

Moniteur.—It was Dauchy, chancellor of state, who was guilty of the indiscretion of removing the sequestration from thirty Turkish vessels which arrived at Trieste and the neighbouring ports; but he took securities.

The council has ordered these vessels to be confiscated; the securities, therefore, will pay the value of them. Seven more vessels were released at Ancona; but also upon giving securities.
