ON application to the subscriber in the recess of the Court, as one of the associate judges of the sixth judicial district of the state of Maryland, by petition in writing of Patrick Fitzpatrick, of Baltimore county, stating that he is in actual confinement, and praying the benefit of the act of the general assembly of the state of Maryland, passed at November session eighteen hundred and five, entitled an act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, and the several supplements thereto on the terms therein mentioned—a schedule of his property and a list of his creditors on oath, as far as he can ascertain being annexed to his said petition; and the said Patrick Fitzpatrick having satisfied me by competent testimony, that he has resided two years within the state of Maryland, immediately preceding the time of his application; and the said Patrick Fitzpatrick having taken the oath of the said act prescribed for delivering up his property; and having given sufficient security for his personal appearance at the county court of Baltimore county, to answer such allegations as may be made against him by his creditors. I therefore order and adjudge, that the said Patrick Fitzpatrick be discharged from imprisonment, and that by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some one of the public newspapers in the city of Baltimore, every other day for three months successively, before the thirtieth day of March next, he give notice to his creditors to appear before the said court, at the Court-house of said county, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of said day, for the purpose of recommending a trustee for their benefit, and to show cause, if any they have, why the said Patrick Fitzpatrick should not have the benefit of the said act and supplements. Given under my hand, this first day of September, eighteen hundred and ten.
