Secret Expedition.

His excellency governor Claiborne, and major G. C. Russell, arrived at the cantonment Washington, from the seat of government on Friday last, and yesterday an order was issued for the embarkation and movement of the army. A strong detachment under col. Covington, will sail this day, and the remainder, under col. Pike, will follow with the least possible delay. It is understood that the army will be joined by general Hampton, on the river, who is hourly expected by way of New-Orleans, and from whom they are to receive further orders, and probably a development of the object of the expedition. It is further said that gov. Claiborne has ordered out the whole body of the militia of the Orleans territory, and we presume the detachment governor Holmes holds in readiness from this territory, will receive marching orders.

DURABLE DYES.

At the late meeting of the "Columbian Agricultural Society," at Georgetown, a premium of twenty dollars was adjudged to Mrs. Martha P. Graham, for the best specimen of Durable Dyes. The following are the Receipts which accompanied her specimens:

To dye Scarlet.

One pound of madder (fresh gathered from the garden) will dye two pounds of wool. The wool must be washed clean, then boiled about 15 minutes in strong alum water; the madder is to be boiled in thin water, the bran being carefully strained from the water. The wool dripped from the alum water, and put in the bran water, must be boiled 15 or 20 minutes, and washed out in soft soap suds after it is cool. By leaving out the alum, it dyes a good brown colour.

To make a Crimson Colour.

To two gallons of the juice of Poke Berries, when they are quite ripe, add half a gallon of strong vinegar, made of the wild crab apple. To dye one pound of wool, which must be first washed very clean with hard soap. The wool, when wrung dry, is to be put into the vinegar and poke berry juice, and simmered in a copper vessel for one hour—then take out the wool and let it drip a while, and spread it in the sun. The vessel must be free from grease of any kind.

To make an Orange Colour.

Take a quantity of Touch-me-not, gathered on the stems, and bruise it well in a wooden mortar—on layers of touch-me-not and wool alternately pour rain water or soft water from a spring, until they are coloured; let it stand twenty-four hours—then have ready strong lather and soft soap, and wash it out and put it immediately in the sun to dry.—Salmon colour may be made by using hard soap instead of soft. These colours brighten by washing.

Touch-me-not is found in low places; the stem is pale green, and the flower nearly of the colour that it dyes. It grows as high as six feet.
