Directions for taking said Oil.
For gout, rheumatism, spleen and sciatic pains, take from 15 to 25 drops as the case may be, on a little sugar, twice or three times a day, and anoint the part affected.
For debilitated constitutions and consumptions, pains in the breast, colds, coughs, internal bruises or sprains, take from 15 to 20 drops morning, noon and night.
For external bruises, flesh wounds, scalds and burns, apply the Oil lightly with a feather, and bind it up with thin, soft linen cloth.
For ulcers, take 20 drops three times a day for 2 weeks previous to the external application, then applying the Oil two or three times a day, as prescribed for burns.

For the cramp in the stomach, bilious cholera and pleurisy, take 5 drops every half hour until the complaint ceases. Some of the Oil on a warm flannel, should be applied to the side.
In croup and mumps, take five drops every hour in molasses and vinegar, a tea spoonful of each, and anoint the throat and glands with the Oil, apply flannel, as in pleurisy.
For whooping-cough give to a child of one year old 3 drops every hour. Anoint the soles of the feet, the wrists, palms of the hands, and from the nape of the neck to the lower part of the back-bone, twice a day with the Oil. This continued, fear not of a speedy cure.—Increase the dose in proportion to the age of the child.

For vomiting and lax, or what is commonly known by the name of Summer complaint in children, to a child of one year old give five drops every two hours in a tea spoonful of molasses, increasing the dose corresponding with the age.
In the measles, the dose may be the same as for the Summer complaint, in order to throw the complaint to the surface.
Dysentery or bloody-flux, (if a grown person) take 20 drops or more, as the constitution will bear, four times a day, in a tea-cup of mullen tea or mutton broth.

For the piles of either kind, take ten drops every three hours in a tea-cup of mullen or beef-tea, and anoint the parts after every evacuation with the Oil.
In plethoric or asthmatic complaints, take 5 drops five or six times a day in a table spoonful of the syrup of horchound, maidenhair, or garlic, but particularly the first thing in the morning and last at night.
For tetter-worm, take 20 drops morning and evening, and anoint the part with the same 4 or 6 times a day.
For the tooth-ache, a few drops on a bit of lint or cotton, applied to the affected tooth, will give almost instant relief.
For a rheumatic pain in the jaw, let it well rubbed with the Oil 3 or 4 times a day.
