IMPORTANT FROM MEXICO

The Mexican Congress-Levy of Fifteen Millions on the Churches-Santa Anna reported to have been shot!

We received a slip last night, from the New Orleans Picayune, dated the 2d inst., containing the following highly important intelligence. The report that Santa has been shot, we consider as wanting confirmation.

We have just received news from Anton Lizardo up to the 20th ult.

One of the letters states that Congress, on the 9th ult., after a stormy session, approved the first section of a bill anthorizing the Government of Mexico to raise \$15,000,000 by the hypothecation or sale of certain goods of the church. Santa Anna opposed this, and it is rumored that his opposition so exasperated his soldiers that they had shot him! Our correspondent says that this report requires confirmation, but there are many circumstances which still render it not impossible such has been the fate of Santa Anna-The army was in great distress,

The passage of the above law has certainly created the greatest excitement in Mexico. The churches are closed, and every indication of mourning and resistance has been evinced by those who support the religious establishments.

The Mexican congress, and Mexican press every where, appear to be thoroughly aroused. The issue they make is "Sor o no ser"-to be or not to be.
