**Camp Meeting.**

**A** CAMP MEETING for Cambridge Circuit will be held on the old Camp Ground near Bucktown. Commencing on Friday the 6th August, and ending on the following Thursday. THE MANAGERS.

By a Resolution of the Quarterly Conference for the better preservation of good order, it is determined that no person will be permitted to pitch a tent on the ground, unless they sign the following rules and agree to enforce them in their tents during the meeting.

**RULE, 1st.** No person will be allowed to pitch a tent on the ground except under the direction of the Managers.

**RULE, 2nd.** The trumpets will be sounded at sunrise around the ground, to awaken the people and again an hour after for family prayer, when it is expected that the proprietor of every tent will have his duty attended to either by himself or a substitute.

**RULE, 3d.** At the sounding of the trumpets for public worship, it is expected all the people will take their seats in the congregation.

**RULE, 4th.** No person will be allowed to remain in the tents during public worship, except in case of sickness or one to take care of the tent.

**RULE, 5th.** No person will be allowed to stand and converse within the circle of the tents during public worship or on the seats at any time.

**RULE, 6th.** No cooking will be allowed on the Sabbath day that can possibly be avoided.

**RULE, 7th.** The trumpets will sound from the stand at 11 o'clock at night, to give notice to those persons who have no tents to stay in that they must leave the ground.

**RULE, 8th.** No person will be allowed to sell any articles of traffic on or near the camp ground, except bread, cakes and horse food, and these only by a written permission from the managers.

**RULE, 9th.** No person will be allowed to keep a boarding tent on the ground unless by a written permission from the Managers.
