garding Slaves and Other Property

Sr. Louis, Feb. 25 .- The following order has just been issued by Maj. Gen. Halleck: Headquarters Department of Missouri,? February 23d, 1862.

The major general commanding the department desires to impress upon all officers the importance of preserving good order and discipline among their troops, and as the armies of the West advance into Tennessee and the Southern States, let us show to our fellow-citizens of these States that we come merely to crush out the rebellion, and restore to them the peace and benepled leaders.

They have been jold that we come to oppress and plunder. By our acts we will undeceire .-We will prove to them that we come to restore, not to violate, the constitution and the laws. In restoring to them the glorious flag of the Union, we will assure them that they shall enjoy under its folds the same protection of life and property

Soldiers! Let no excuse on your part tarnish the glory of our arms.

The orders beretofore issued from this department in regard to pillaging, marauding and the destruction of private property and stealing, and the concealment of slaves, must be strictly eaforced. It does not belong to the military to decide upon the relation of master and slave .-Such questions must be settled by the civil courts. No fugitive slave will, therefore, be admitted within our lines or camps except when specially ordered by the General commanding. Women and childred, merchants, farmers, mechanics and lar Generals and piddling over petty jobs, the all persons not in arms are regarded as non-combatants, and are not to be molested, either in their person or property. It, however, they assist and aid the enemy, they become beligerents, service which that Government can now render and will be treated as such. As they violate the laws of war they will be made to suffer the penalties of such violation. Military stores and public property of the enemy must be surrendered. and any attempt to conceal such property by fraudulent transfer or otherwise will be punished, but no private property will be touched unless by order of the General commanding.

Whenever it becomes necessary, forced contributions for supplies and subsistance for our troops will be made. Such levies will be made as light as possible, and be so distributed as to counted for as heretofore directed.

These orders wili be read at the head of every regiment, and all officers are commanded to strictly enforce them. By order of
