The Draft in Maryland.

The draft of the militia of Maryland took place on Wednesday last in such counties as had .completed and revised their enrollment lists .-The quota of the State has been fixed at 19,341 men. Of this number 13,311 volunteers for three years has been furnished, leaving a balance of 6,000 to be raised by draft. Allegany, Washington, Cecil and Kent counties, having furnished their full quotas, will escape the draft. The following official table shows the population of each county, the aggregate of volunteers and drafted men apportioned among each, the number of volunteers already furnished, and the net residue to be drafted after apportioning excesses:

The draft for Talbot county was held in Easton, on Wednesday by W. H. Harrison, Esq., the Commissioner appointed for that purpose .- i The first name was drawn just at 12 o'clock M., and the duties were performed without a single interruption, except when Mr. Joseph Rasin's name was called out. The fact of his being drafted appeared to cause great rejoicing among the Secesh, so much that a number of those present clapped their hands and stamped their feet. Such proceedings was an outrage, and as an act of that kind, on such an occasion, was calculated to cause a disturbance, the instigator of it ought to have been taken in hand forthwith. No other cause actuated them to such a course than that Mr. Rasin is a firm and active Union man. There was no liquor sold in town until late in the day and the streets were perfectly quiet. The whole matter was conducted with the utmost fairness, and we presume as quietly as in any other county in the State. Had it not been for Secessionists discouraging volunteering one year or eighteen months ago we doubt whether there would have been any draft in the county at all, or at least the number would have been much smaller than it was. Everything that could be said or done was used to prevent volunteering, until recently, after Secesh began to see that there was a prospect of having a good sprinkling of it in the ranks, and then volunteer became a grand institution. Various have been the rumors and predictions in reference to the draft. Some declared that the government was afraid to make the draft, while others declared that if they were drafted their commanding officer would be the first to catch a ball .-The first prediction has been exploded, and we presume the latter will amount to about the same. The draft has, no doubt, caused the shedding of many a tear, and will leave some quite destitute, but such is the reward of Secession.

We here insert that portion of the act of Congress which refers to the mustering in of drafted

"A printed or written notice of his enrollment; and draft, and of the place of rendezvous of the drafted military force, shall thereupon be served, by a person to be appointed by the Commissioner, upon each person so drafted, either by delivering the same in person, or by leaving it at his last known place of residence. 7th. Any! person so drafted may offer a substitute at the time of the rendezvous of the orafted militia force, and such substitute, if he shall be an able boided man, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, and shall consent in writing, with the consent of his parent or guardian, if a minor, to subject himself to all the duties and obligations to which his principal would have been subject had he personally served shall be accepted in heu of such principal. 8th. The persons thus drafted shall assemble at the county seat of their respective counties within five days after the time of drafting, whence transportation will be furnished them by the Governors! of the several States to the place of repdezvous. 9th. As soon as the draft has been made and the names marked on the enrolment list, the Commissioner will send a copy of the draft to the Commandant of the repdezvous, and anoth er copy of the same to the Adjutant General of the State, who will immediately organize the drafted men into companies and regiments of infantry, by assigning one hundred and one men to eash company, and ten companies to each regiment; and send a copy of the organization to the Commandant of the rendezvous. 10th. At the expiration of the time allowed for the drafted men to reach the rendezvous, the Commandant shall proceed to complete the organization of the companies and regiment by proclaiming the names of the regimental commissioned officers, which shall be designated in accordance with

he laws of the respective States, the number! and grade being the same as in the volunteer service; and in case the laws of any State shall provide for an election of officers, they shall be elected under the direction of the Commandant of the rendezvous- and reported forthwith to the Governors of such States, in order that they be commissioned; and the non-commissioned may be appointed either before or after muster, as the Colonel of the regiment shall decide."
